From the Pastor

Welcome to another new year full of new frustrations – and opportunities. This may seem like a strange way to start but here's the thing: if it weren't for the frustrations nothing would ever change, but because we have them we get creative, and we come up with

new ideas. If it weren't for the challenges we wouldn't grow. If it weren't for the grief we wouldn't appreciate the blessings.

"...they who are in the stream of Providence are all the time carried along toward everything that is happy; whatever may be the appearance of the means," AC 8478:4

This is actually a doctrine of the New Church as well as not-so-common sense. Practically speaking, we have problems in our lives, not because the Lord intends for us to suffer but because He

knows we need improvement, and that we won't move unless we experience a certain amount of dissatisfaction.

That said, one of the greatest gifts of the human mind is our ability to take experience from one realm of life and apply it to another in some unconventional way. It's a function of rationality – the ability to make a relationship between two things in order to draw a new conclusion. This is why we have parables in the Word, and the “science” of correspondences: we see how things work on one level and apply them on another level, as for example seeds in good ground representing truths in a good, receptive mind.

This applies to the church just as much as it does to us individually. Among our current challenges are decreasing church attendance and a looming financial concern. These are not *causes* for concern, they are *symptoms* of concern, and as such they are potent indicators of the need for new, creative, rational thinking. If they are in fact problems they are problems we can solve, and we *will* solve them if we apply ourselves to the issues with imagination, confidence, and, of course, doctrinal integrity.

For example, sales and marketing people can tell us about how to approach people with a view to meeting their needs. Lawyers and engineers and teachers and contractors can tell us about logic and influence and planning and communication. Of course we start with what the Writings teach about the church (and we have to take that seriously!) but then what?

We have a tremendous pool of human talent in this congregation; it really is amazing when you consider all the skills, degrees, qualifications and achievements that are represented among us. Surely all this is more than enough to overcome any of the challenges that threaten the church if we will just apply ourselves and work together for this common goal. Surely, in fact, this is WHY we have all this talent and WHY we have our challenges – because the Lord has chosen us to do some new and better things in the church.

I look forward to working with all of you in this New Year as we work through our challenges and frustrations to a very fruitful, peaceful, prosperous and rewarding state – not just for ourselves but for all the people the Lord has in mind to join us.

Sermon Topics for January, 2017

8th: FAMILY SERVICE: 1 Sam. 3, the Lord's call to Samuel when he was still a boy. Two of the things this story illustrates are: 1) how the Lord calls to us even before we know much of anything, and 2) how we come to understand the Lord more and more clearly as we persevere at listening. ~ BDS

15th: Numbering the People: In the Word, sometimes this is commanded, sometimes it is condemned. What is it really all about spiritually, and how can we do it right? The children's talk will be based on Numbers 1:1-19. ~ MDG

22nd: "Be Fruitful and Multiply!" These words from Genesis 1:28 are full of spiritual significance. Today you will see how we can all apply them regardless of our age or marital status, and why they are so important for eternal life. ~ MDG

29th: The Second Coming. Christians are waiting for the Lord's return. We claim He has already come. No other faith has made this pronouncement. Let your light shine. The hope is that the way we treat each other and people we meet is a reflection of the Lord's Coming in our lives. ~ MEF

The Board of Trustees and School Board held a Joint Meeting on December 13. The following business was addressed:

1. Financial summary presented by the Treasurer.
2. Discussed application for a Glencairn Foundation Grant. The Board decided to apply for roof replacement funds for the original section of the building. An updated strategic plan is in progress for the grant application, due January 9.

3. The Principal and School Board provided a school update, including discussions of school Tuition for 2016-17, future staff and student enrollment outlook, and outreach and networking efforts. The School Treasurer will resign at the end of the current school year; a replacement will be needed starting this summer.
4. The facilities head reported on the never-ending list of needed repairs and maintenance items throughout the building and property.

The next meeting of the Trustees will be on January 10 at 7:30pm.

A Practical Look into the Future

For this financial year (July – June) our board took a leap of faith and planned for a balanced budget for the first time in many years. As of the end of November we are ahead of last year's pace and so have a reasonable chance of achieving this goal. More importantly, we know that our salary costs are going to rise significantly and our General Church subsidy is going to disappear very soon, making a balanced budget even more challenging in future years. So we need to start adjusting our contributions accordingly, lest we are forced to start cutting back on uses.

Of course we also confidently hope for an increase in our membership, but in order to achieve *that* goal we have to ramp up our giving now to make sure we provide the natural and spiritual environment that new members will find attractive.

Can't Attend Regularly?

At this time we would like to appeal especially to readers who are not able to attend regularly, but who love the teachings of the New Church and would like to see the church grow and serve more people. We are doing everything we can to make these teachings accessible – locally and on the Internet. One recent innovation is that sermons are being recorded and uploaded as audio files on our website, www.theWNC.org. We also have a new 5-year strategic

plan that includes some critical additions to our programming – as soon as we can raise the funds to support them.

So even if you can't attend often at Mitchellville, we want you to know that you can be part of this effort and that your contribution can make a BIG difference, both financially and spiritually. After all “community” is not just a physical thing; it really helps to know that we have the support of folks like you who share our vision.

Bryn Athyn College Scholarships for Women

Two Education Scholarships are offered to women attending the Bryn Athyn College of the New Church for the 2017-2018 school year. Eligible applicants must intend to become New Church teachers, and have declared education as a major, minor or part of an Interdisciplinary Degree. The annual scholarship award is \$2,100. One award is for an incoming freshman, and one for a current Bryn Athyn College of the New Church education student.

Three scholarships are offered to women attending Bryn Athyn College of the New Church and who are studying **Religion**, participating in the **MARS** program or are **international** students. There are (2) \$2,000 and (1) \$1,000 scholarship awarded to eligible recipients who exemplify the teachings of the New Church. Applications are due February 1, 2017.
