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Dear Friends,

One of the benefits of church membership is the mutual support and sense of community that can develop as we strive together for spiritual ideals in our daily lives. Of course a lot of this work is internal and we don't necessarily want to share our struggles, but even so, being connected with people we know are doing the same work is reassuring, and every now and then we find that a specific concern *does come up for discussion* in really helpful ways.



So one of the things we need to do in the church is build and strengthen the bonds of community that make such connections possible. We can do this is worship services, class discussions,

and shared social or recreational events, not to mention the occasional work party.

This month one of our best opportunities to build bridges and strengthen our church community comes in the form of our annual **school open house.** Really... I'm serious.

Your involvement with the school may be peripheral at best, for any number of good reasons, but the fact is that this is still our very best avenue of introduction to the church for new contacts. When parents apply to the school to enroll their children one of the first things they do is come and interview with me about the teachings of the New Church. And in that interview I appeal to them all to consider the marvelous new teachings of this church and I invite them to attend with us. Some do and some don't, as you know. But MY invitation won't mean much if they don't start building bridges of connection right away with other members.

This is why your attendance at the school open house can be so valuable. In fact you don't need to have *anything* to do with the school, but as a church member you can be welcoming and encouraging and begin to get to know these new contacts. For one thing *they* need to know that there is a supportive community attached to the school, and it's nice for them to see some of the people who support and subsidize it financially – which we all do. In addition it's important that *we* understand the sort of concerns that bring these people to our school.

Why are they here? What do they want? What are they missing in other schools or communities that draw them to this place? What

hope can we offer them beyond a quality education in a small classroom environment? Possibly you will be able to share an experience that inspires or motivates that one special person who is looking for just what you describe!

When it comes to the church I often say "the more the merrier." In this case with the school particularly one of the big reasons is to establish common ground, to help new contacts *identify* with at least some of us, and us with them through shared interests, background or commitments. You may *not* have anything in common with someone you meet for the first time, but that is exactly why "more is merrier:" if you don't someone else will, and if the one person who has a shared interest is *not* there to share it, an opportunity could be lost.

Please give it some thought. The open house is on Tuesday night, March 21st, at 7:00 PM. It begins with refreshments and a short talk and illustration of our church focus, and then goes to introductions of our teachers and classroom visits. Come and meet the people who will help our school prosper and who may very well end up sitting in the church pews with you.

February Inspiration:

Even though it's hard to call these past couple months "winter" it is still a chilly and discouraging time of year as students and teacher deal with less sun, illness and the sense of a long year yet ahead. It is partly for these reasons, that Theta Alpha plans a teacher luncheon on Valentine's Day. This wonderful encouragement comes complete with break duty covered so that the teachers can enjoy a longer, quieter lunch than usual. Thanks very much for this support!

Equally encouraging and supportive was a meal and discussion offered by one of our parents, Nicodemus Morfaw. Nic frequently has positive and encouraging things to say about WNCS, but this time we specifically asked him to come and talk to the

teachers about his experiences immigrating to the United States and to reflect on cultural differences around education, discipline and respect between Cameroon and the US. (A significant portion of our student body is second generation children of West African parents). Nic, shared many useful insights from his story of immigration (via Germany) but he also managed to weave in much encouragement and praise for the WNCS staff (and buy us dinner!)

Ongoing Professional Development:

Nic Morfaw's presentation was part of an ongoing effort to reinspire and help the teachers to continue learning useful tools of the trade. This year we've also heard presentations on: the teaching (and assessment) of reading; designing lessons for wider ranges of learning styles, and strategies for effective discipline. We still look forward to: a tutorial on the teaching of research skills; anxiety and depression in students, and strategies around the most effective use of homework.

Also, several of our teachers are involved this year in the systemwide process of teacher support visits, either observing or being observed by another professional educator to give specific feedback on the teacher's work in the classroom.

Sermon Topics for February, 2017

5th: You CAN Trust Your Senses: why our experience in this world is important AND compatible with Revelation – as long as it is informed by valid spiritual principles! "Oh, *taste and see* that the Lord is good" – Psalm 34:8. The children's talk will be about touching the Lord's garment (Mark 6:45-56). **Holy Supper** will be offered at the end of the service.

12th: FAMILY SERVICE: Remembering and Forgetting. You can remember something from many years ago but forget something that occurred yesterday. Today we will address how both remembering and forgetting are useful to our spiritual life. In His mercy, the Lord says, "I will remember My covenant which is between Me and you" (Gen 9:15). ~ MEF

19th: The Cycles of Natural & Spiritual Life: the preservation of the universes is a perpetual creation. This applies in spiritual as well as natural life. So beginning with Gen. 8:22 we will explore the parallels of natural growth to spiritual growth and see why knowing about this is so important. -MDG

26th: Community & the Grand Man: People are designed to live in community... but why? What is it that we need from one another, even when we don't consciously want it? And how can we strengthen our sense of community in the church, in preparation for a heavenly life? See Genesis 11:1-9. – MDG


The Amazing Interlude
