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Dear Friends,

What is your sense of Divine Providence? Do you think of it as a sort of mechanistic thing, operating dispassionately according to

fixed laws of order, "quid pro quo" and all that? Or do you think of it as a guiding hand in human affairs?

If the former, where is the Humanity – the Divine love – in it? If the latter, where is our freedom?

We all know that there is no such thing as predestination – except that we are all created for heaven. But how does the Lord work to maintain order without imposing on our often foolish choices?

Well, I think the first principle is that He is more concerned with spiritual order than with natural order. In other words, He will permit all sorts of things in order to preserve our ability to think and reason, choosing heaven or hell for ourselves. See the book, *Divine Providence*, #71-99, also #214-220.

But I think it is also critical to recognize that He does not leave us all alone in these choices – or in our responses to the choices other people make. Rather, as we read, "The Lord is present with everyone, urgent and pressing to be received..." (TCR #766). He is, as John notes in the book of *Revelation* (3:20), standing at the door knocking. And *throughout the Word* He pleads with us to open the door by doing what He teaches.

In addition He provides very subtle influences in the form of what we call "associate spirits," who bring us the perspectives of heaven and of hell, always in a balanced way so that we are assured of the opportunity to make good choices if we are willing. AND He has provided civic and cultural norms that encourage personal integrity (see TCR #498).

Still, we are free. Our spiritual lives depend on it. And this free-dom includes the way we *respond* to problems. In short, we can look at ourselves or others and find reasons to be angry, cynical or depressed, or we can look to the Lord and find wisdom, love and the power to persevere. Seeing evil, we can usually find ways to understand it and contextualize it so that it doesn't drive us crazy. And there will always be something we can learn from it.

This applies to the church as a whole and not just ourselves as individual members. Somehow, despite all the discouraging issues we face in the church today, we need to focus on our opportunities and

find ways to be optimistic. We need to be the salt and the light that the Lord referenced *immediately after He warned His disciples about the persecutions they would face (Matthew* 5:13-14). But what, we might ask, does this look like in practical terms?

Providence in Every Detail

As Bishop Keith said in his sermon here last April, we need to use

our heads and plan, *but not worry!* The Lord can bring good out of anything that happens, and He will if we will look to Him, trust Him, and do our best to make the right decisions. As I also wrote in a recent sermon, He has ALL the power to get anything done, but He gives us the freedom and responsibility to make the decisions that open the way for His power to flow though us. (A lot of electrical metaphors come to mind but I'll spare you for now.)

The thing is, we can't force change on other people, but everything we think and do has an influence on them whether we like it or not. It also strengthens the will – whether the new (good) will or the old (selfish) will within ourselves – so it's important to choose our words and actions carefully.

Anyway, whether you're at peace or in some kind of turmoil, whether you're comfortable or on edge, whether you feel loved or slighted try to remember AC 6489, where we read,

"...The Lord's providence is such that it is linked together with foresight; the one does not exist without the other. For evil things are foreseen, but good ones are provided.... Nothing is therefore allowed to happen except to the end that something good may come out of it."

No one ever said life in this world was going to be easy. Rather it's all about patience, learning and self-discipline. It's about subordinating ourselves to others and especially to the Lord, who is the only one who knows what we really need.

Doing these things doesn't necessarily result in a more comfortable life, nor in a bigger, better church, but it provides for the most important thing of all, which is the influence of heaven on earth, the one thing that can lead *eventually* to real peace and blessing.

Of course all this may seem just a tad miserable, or at any rate martyrish, but in fact there's an unexpected benefit that accrues in the process. As we read in a critical series in *Divine Providence* (#34-44), the more nearly a person is conjoined with the Lord, the wiser and happier he becomes *AND the more distinctly he appears to be master of himself!* Really, what could be better than that?

In this way the Lord's own words are fulfilled, where He said, "Whoever desires to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for My sake and the gospel's will save it" (Mark 8:35). "So the last will be first, and the first last" (Matt. 20:16).

(1) Thanks in large measure to a few outstanding donations, but also to the deep commitment of all, this last year we received significantly more in church contributions than ever before in our history! We began the year with a \$233,000 budget for donations and by the end of May we had already received \$285,000. This is fantastic and a very hopeful sign for the future. In addition our endowment income continues to grow, thanks to the Healthy Church Match program that wraps up next year. AND we continue to receive very generous support in terms of grants from the Asplundh and Glencairn Foundations, especially for our school. We are indeed richly blessed.

Money certainly isn't everything, but it pays the bills, and we want you all to know how very grateful we can all be for one another's ongoing church support.



(2) With regard to estate planning our only suggestion apart from the fact that summer is a good time to think about these

things, is this: of course we all want to leave a legacy for our children or family members; that goes without saying! But what if you were to add the church or school as if it were one of your children? If you have three children and the church makes a fourth, the difference in the inheritance is probably not huge, but could be a great benefit to the church. Just a thought!
