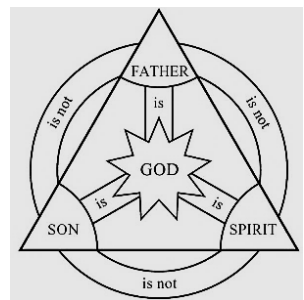
The Incredible Concept of Christmas

In the *Arcana* #2034 there is a lengthy discussion of how God created a finite humanity for Himself and then glorified that humanity in order to ensure the vital conjunction of the Infinite with the finite human race on earth. But it goes on to say that this whole idea is so preposterous to most people, especially the “learned” of the world, and so far beyond their understanding, that they can't begin to appreciate it – and so they don't really believe it.

So let's do a quick check. Are WE really clear about this, or do we have a lot of doubts and questions, too?

How CAN the Infinite become finite, anyway? And how can the Infinite God be limited by consciousness – and even suffering – in this world while yet remaining in control of the entire, limitless universe and every speck of detail in it?

In the Christian world generally this problem is “solved” by supposing two distinct and separate personalities in God, and then again, with the Holy Spirit, three of them, as shown in the diagram on the right.



But in the New Church we understand that God, being Infinite, cannot be divided into parts or persons. Rather His infinite love and wisdom, though perfectly Human, are so far beyond our comprehension as to be completely invisible to us, beyond any idea of “person.” Therefore in order to appear before people in ancient times He let angels, prophets or kings represent Him. However, when the evils and falsities of this world became so obnoxious that this representative presence was not sufficient to maintain order, God created a human body of His own through which His love and wisdom could function most perfectly in accommodation to our worldly states. So God took on a visible personality for the first and only time in the history of the world. This is what we call “the Incarnation.”

Of course this *form* of His Humanity involved limitations, but here’s the thing: His life and soul, His motivating love was always Divine, it was only His intellectual consciousness that suffered constraints *until He perfected that also* in the course of His 33 years in the flesh. But He went through this process specifically so that He could confront the evils and falsities of this world by Himself, and overcome them in such a way as to instruct, inspire and motivate rather than compel others to believe in Him.

I will have a lot more along these lines to share with you in the society class on Friday, the 7th, and I hope, too, to spark some good discussion about this Incarnation of pure love and wisdom. Got questions? Come and ask! Meanwhile remember the New Church mantra: one God in one Person, the Lord Jesus Christ, born into this world to glorify “the human” in Himself and so restore the integrity of the link between heaven and earth.

Finally, note that the **Holy Supper** will be offered at the close of the regular church service on Sunday morning, December 9th. It will be a timely opportunity to connect with the Lord in this multi-sensory way in this season of His advent.

Meanwhile, the business of identifying and calling a new pastor to replace me in July will be intensifying this month as Bishop Keith

presents possible candidates for our committee to consider. This will almost certainly lead to invitations for two or three men to come and visit, interview and preach for us in the New Year. Money Matters

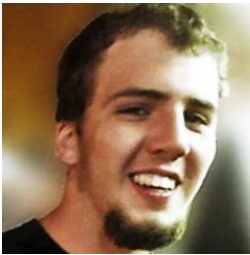

Memorial for Kyle Eugene Cole



On the evening of November 14th our dear friend Kyle Cole was killed in a terrible automobile accident. This was just days short of Kyle’s 21st birthday. He is the son of Eugene and Nancy (Needer) Cole, brother to Jason Smith, Austin & Dillon Cole.

Kyle grew up in the Mitchellville area, attended the Washington New Church School from Kindergarten through 9th grade. He then went to the Academy of the New Church in Bryn Athyn, PA, where he was involved in wrestling and football and won the championship and graduated high school there in 2016. In his published obituary it said, “Kyle never met a stranger. He was a big, fun-loving friend to all. He loved the outdoors, sports, and roughhousing with the guys. He worked hard, played hard, and was fiercely devoted to family and friends.”

A memorial service was held at the Washington New Church for Kyle on Saturday, November 17th. The Rev. Alan Cowley flew up from Florida to perform the service. For those who were able to

attend the service there would be no doubt that Kyle was indeed a friend to all. The church and the lobby were filled with family, neighbors, work friends, school buddies from WNCS and ANC, teachers, coaches and many others (220) who came to pay their respects and to support Kyle's family.

Alan began his address saying, "The title for my address this afternoon in honor of our beloved Kyle Eugene Cole is **BIG LOVE**. In all of the thoughts and messages that I received from the various people who know Kyle there were two main things that nearly everyone mentioned: First was his big presence, both physically and socially; and the second was his big heart."

This big heart, this love Kyle had for everyone he was acquainted with was a shared joy.

Divine Love and Wisdom #47 says, "Love consists in this, that its own should be another's; to feel the joy of another as joy in oneself, that is loving." The atmosphere of that reciprocal love for Kyle was really palpable at the service along with the grief.

Alan went on to speak about the nature of grief. "Grief is the feeling we get when what we love has been harmed or taken away from us. Grief and love are so interconnected that if God were to magically remove our grief, that love would be lost too."

Yet, love still showed itself at the service in many ways - in the thoughts and memories of those who spoke after the service, in the hugs, shared tears and even the laughter of friends and family talking of their times together with Kyle.

In his address Alan shared an open honesty of the pain such a young death causes. Yet my take-away was this - as Kyle's friends and family felt the joy of Kyle's life as their own joy, so too all those present at the service felt the family's grief and sadness as their own as well. That kind of mutual love and sharing cannot help but be an ongoing support for family and those close to them.

Let us all continue to hold this family in our thoughts and prayers.

Board of Trustees meeting -- Nov. 6 2018

The Board heard reports and discussed building and grounds maintenance and repair; financial status, including outcomes from the General Church Treasurer's meeting, attended by Chuck Quintero, and future needs of the Society; updates from the Pastoral search committee; and plans for the upcoming Fall Society Meeting. The Board also confirmed John Kern as a new member of the Board, with thanks, to fulfill a one-year vacancy.

Fall Society meeting - Nov. 9 2018

There were 28 members present, representing a quorum. Principal Brian Smith provided an update on the school, including status of the new High School program development. Mark Wyncoll, from the General Church Development Office, thanked and encouraged the Society for their strong fundraising. Budget and investment reports were presented. George Cooper (Chair) provided status of the Pastoral search committee, reporting that Bishop Keith will visit the committee on Nov. 29 with potential Pastoral candidate names, and asking for continued input and feedback from all in the congregation. Eric Genzlinger was recognized (in absentia) for his outstanding support of the church facilities.

Third Annual WNC Men's Retreat

We had three new recruits for this very special weekend at the beginning of November this year – even as we sorely missed three of our regulars. After a chill rain on the first night we had such gorgeous weather on Saturday and Sunday we felt as if we'd gotten away with something!

The program followed the usual pattern with doctrinal presentations followed by lots of discussion, shared cooking and cleanup responsibilities, worship and lots of great fellowship. Note, it never gets too personal, but we do get to know each other very well, and always come away with a great sense of comradeship and community.

This year's focus was on the specific qualities of masculine wisdom, and included some insightful research on the nature of forensic and domestic duties in the history of western culture. We also discussed the various ways that men confront the temptations we face in this world.

We're already thinking about next year's retreat, which we hope to hold at the end of September, and we're considering a theme of government (spiritual, natural, ecclesiastical and so on). Meanwhile, we hope to get together now and then throughout the year, so watch for announcements as we always welcome newcomers to all these occasions.

be able to discuss further proceedings. So please don't ask them to do that.

The committee will consider the names of possible candidates and will then begin the interview process, with the task of working with the Bishop to find a person who will best meet the needs of the Society. When that person is identified, the Bishop will nominate a candidate for the position of Pastor, and the Board of Trustees and the Society will have opportunities to vote on the nominee. That vote should take place in mid-winter.

In the meantime, continue to talk to committee members, but don't expect them to reply; they are in listening mode now. Our next meeting will be on Thursday, December 13th.
