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
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#### Dear Friends,

First, on behalf of the three ministers at the WNC I want to thank all of you who contributed to our generous Christmas gifts. We feel your appreciation – very much. In addition it has been a pleasure to work with you and, hopefully, to have served you in some useful ways this past year.

#### What Next?

The New Year always seems like an opportunity to make some fresh starts, although my experience has been that resolutions are never really effective unless there's a great deal more than a time



element to them. Life is a balancing act and unless the desired outcome of a change is not seen as clearly *more important* than what's going on right now, it won't last long. That said, any new beginning is an opportunity to re-evaluate old habits, and of course we know that repentance of bad habits is a lifelong responsibility.

When it comes to the organized church it has always seemed curious to me that it is normally seen as a bastion of traditional values, including traditions themselves that may have outlived their usefulness. Certainly we admire the conviction of our founding fathers and we respect the doctrinal thinking that led them to establish the representative customs we hold dear. But in my studies over the years I have discovered that there are other perfectly good and right ways to apply the doctrines – and even (gasp!) that some of the original thinking about this may have been flawed.

For example, we know that the work of repentance must precede the peace of regeneration, but this does not mean that we must begin every service of worship with a focus on the acknowledgment of our evils. We could just as well start with praise and the acknowledgement of the *Lord's* love and wisdom, and *then* reflect on our need for His help, later in the service. So as you may be aware we have begun doing this with our new orders of service.

Again, why do we keep the two tables for baptism and the holy supper high up in the inner sanctuary? There is a lovely symbolism in doing that, but they could just as well be kept on the lower, introductory level of the chancel, or, if we had designed it differently, on the floor of the nave, closest to the people.

Many of our old hymns stir deep affections in us, at least partly because we grew up with them. But what of the people who didn't grow up with them? Are 300 year-old words and music likely to appeal to young people or the "unchurched"? In fact, do they?

I don't write any of this to arouse anxiety or fear of loss, but as we prepare, beginning this month, to counsel the bishop on a change of pastors we have an opportunity to consider possible new ways of doing all sorts of things in the church. Of course I'm not recommending sudden, radical change, but rather an *openness to change* as our needs and circumstances have changed.

#### **New Pastor Selection Process**

So you know, our committee has narrowed the field to three possible candidates to consider for the pastoral office here this coming summer. This has already led to invitations for them all to come and visit, interview and preach for us in the New Year. So please, see the announcements about this on page p. 10 and be sure to attend on those occasions if you want to have a say in who is called.

### People Ask...

"Mike, what're you going to do in retirement?" Well, the truth is, I don't know! I have about 40 years of my life in files that need to be sorted and culled, I have some hobbies I'd like to cultivate, and I might even be tempted to write a book. As for church work I am waiting to see what the new pastor might need or want, as I will take direction from him. If nothing else I might help out with some routine maintenance. And I'm waiting for the new bishop to take office to see what if anything he might need or want from me.

#### **Money Matters**

As we begin another new year, one of the special uses we are actively contemplating is the development of an innovative new four-year high school program. You will be reading more about this in communications that will be widely circulated in the coming months. Meanwhile, the project puts a renewed focus on our entire school program, from junior kindergarten to grade 12, and highlights our need to be clear about this mission.

It IS a mission, after all, not just a service we provide for our own children. It is one of the BEST things we can do to inform and encourage whole families in the beautiful, life-affirming doctrines of the New Church. But of course, like all practical uses, it costs money, and we don't know of any private schools that can operate on tuition income alone. Some sort of endowment is essential.

With this in mind we have a suggestion. If or when you plan for a distribution of your estate assets when you "graduate" to the other world, would you consider leaving something specifically for our *school endowment*, or perhaps our *scholarship fund?* Obviously we don't want a lot of money tied up in ways that bind the future of the church, but if you used words expressing a *preference* for school endowment but a willingness to defer to other uses if the school doesn't need the money, all would be well. Any competent financial advisor – including Mark Wyncoll, at the General Church Development Office – could help you make the wording clear.

Please note that over the last 10 years or so we have seen at least 17 new members baptized into this church through their connection with the school. Even so, this is not the main reason for our commitment to New Church education; rather we do it to help all who are ready and willing to learn the vital truths of the revelation of the Lord's Second Coming. And we do it, or we should do it, without thought of financial return. We just need to pay the bills!

#### From the Principal

Welcome back to all students and teachers! (Including a new student, Jaiden Selby, who has joined our third grade)

Over the break we posted a job offering as we search for an excellent, "educational coach" to be a key player in our high school program. If you know anyone who has a burning interest in developing New Church education and brings interesting training and/or experience to the table, please put them in contact with me!

Arcana Coelestia 3336 tells us that "nothing is ever able to enter the human memory and remain there unless there is some affection or love to attract it." This statement is both self-evident, confirmed quickly in our own experience, and also profound in its implications for education. We can easily bring to mind lectures or conversations where the person speaks at length on a subject towards which we feel no affection. It can be almost physically painful to maintain the proper polite expression of attention and we are unlikely to remember anything about the subject. Contrast this experience with your best memories of reading, listening or problem solving in an area that captured your interest, where you learned rapidly and almost effortlessly, tugged along by an eager curiosity to learn more. It is this "flow-state" or "play-state" that we hope to cultivate in our students in order to bring the most value to the hours they have for education.

Good teachers, especially good New Church teachers already understand this need to engage the affections. A difference we envision in this high school program is the opportunity to better structure the whole context of learning around this insight, rather than merely making use of it in the delivery of a given lesson. Conventional teachers are often pressured and constrained by a great deal of content promises which push them to move steadily and rapidly through dense content with the requirement that students rapidly memorize and feed back the content to prove that they are "learning." This relationship is very common, even between good students and good teachers in a good school. And there *are* some affections attached to this process (otherwise memory couldn't occur

at all). The student and teacher can find affections around competition, pleasing the teacher, gaining some kind of future reward (grades, college admission etc). The most successful students will also connect with some genuine loves and interests in the subject – though tragically many students report chronic boredom and frustration with the content which has been carefully chosen for them by the culture into which they are being trained.

What can our high school do differently? By using a small-scale coaching model which allows the freedom to design individual, self-paced programs, we gain the ability to help the student find many more opportunities for affection-fueled learning in areas where he or she finds an active interest. It is not that high school freshman are above mediate motivations of pleasing others, competing and being recognized for secondary achievements. Nor do these same freshmen have a mature knowledge of their own interests. The difference is that we can build a program where affection-fueled learning for useful purposes is the central focus of the program. Exploring, identifying and following up on potential areas of interest can be facilitated and scaffolded so that our students graduate with a precocious self-knowledge, born of regular experiential learning in areas of genuine affection and a well-developed ability to direct their activities in productive directions.

#### **Report of Pastor Search Committee**

The Committee has met twice with Bishop Brian Keith (on November 29<sup>th</sup> and December 13<sup>th</sup>) to discuss possible and potential candidates for replacing our retiring pastor next June. Initially, the committee reviewed the status and possible availability of all the active ministers in the General Church to narrow the scope of the search, and finally has asked three ministers to visit our Society and to meet with the committee. After the last of these meetings, - in about the middle of February – the Committee will meet to select a candidate for recommendation to the Bishop as our next Pastor. The Bishop will then make a nomination to the Society for a vote in late February or early March

The schedule for the visiting candidates is as follows:

Rev. Glenn "Mac" Frazier will visit our Society from Thursday evening, January 10th to Sunday afternoon, January 13<sup>th</sup>. He will visit the School on Friday, give a Society Doctrinal Class on Friday evening at 7:30 PM, and preside at the usual Church service on Sunday at 11:00 AM. After graduation from Theological School, Mac served two years in Pittsburg and two years in Bryn Athyn as assistant pastor before serving as Pastor of the New Church in Austin, Texas for 5 years. Most recently, he has served 2 years as Assistant Pastor in the Glenview, Illinois Church. Mac will be staying with George and Mary Cooper.

Rev. Mark Allais will visit our Society at the end of January. He will arrive with his wife Karen on Wednesday afternoon, January 23<sup>rd</sup>, and will return to South Africa on Tuesday evening, January 29<sup>th</sup>. Mark (and Karen) will spend time in the school, and Mark will deliver the address at the Swedenborg's birthday banquet on Friday, January 25<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 PM. Mark will also preside at the Church service on the 27<sup>th</sup> at 11:00 AM. After graduating from Theological School, Mark served as an assistant for one year before being called to serve as Pastor of the New Church Buccleuch (near Johannesburg, South Africa), where he has been for the past 9 years. Mark and Karen will be staying with Chuck and Candy Quintero.

Rev. Jared Buss will visit our Society from Thursday afternoon, February 7<sup>th</sup> through Sunday evening, February 10<sup>th</sup>. He will visit the school on Friday, will give a Society Doctrinal Class on Friday evening at 7:30 PM, and will preside at the usual Church service on Sunday at 11:00 AM. After graduating from Theological School, Jared was appointed as Assistant to the Pastor of the Olivet Church in Toronto, Canada, where he has served for the past 4 years. Jared will be staying with George and Mary Cooper.
