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Dear Friends,

As your committee continues its work of interviewing candidates for "my" job I'd like to call attention once again to the challenge of church growth, or perhaps I should say church decline, in the hope that you will give some serious thought to any ways that you could support a new pastor in church growth opportunities.

For a long time our church was plagued by the idea that numbers

didn't matter; that it is only the quality of membership that counts. Then we went through a period of fixation on numerical growth – until we found that we were not having much success, despite our efforts. Now we are facing the worst predicament of all, namely, apathy, and the fact that it has become more fashionable especially for young people to declare themselves agnostic than to affiliate with any church, not just here but all over Europe and America.

I could write a lengthy doctrinal paper on why church growth is important, including why we should not shy away from setting real goals for growth. After all, the church exists to serve vital uses in people's lives, and the more members we have the better we can serve those uses. But the real challenge is what to do about it. Here are some suggestions:

- Invite a friend or colleague to a church service or a study group. Sit with them. Invite them to lunch afterwards. Topics are announced every month in the Echo.
- Share a book or pamphlet with anybody you know. We have some first class, non-threatening literature readily available for your use.
- Start a service group based at the church and invite friends and neighbors to help out. Start each meeting with prayer.
- Put one of our magnetic decals on your car. The more people see 'em, the more they'll think about us. And no, they won't damage the paint on your car.

- Go to our website, <u>www.theWNC.org</u>, and look for the tab that says, "Testimonials." Write one and submit it to Bonnie for uploading.
- Look for opportunities to drop little nuggets of NC teaching into casual conversations nothing preachy, just observations based on how meaningful these ideas are to you.
- Visit other churches. Compare and contrast. See what is working in our culture and why, and ask yourself, "What could WE do better?"

These are just a few thoughts for starters. A new pastor will undoubtedly come with new ideas. The question is, "What kind of church growth initiatives are YOU prepared to support?"

The "Search" Continues

As this issue of the Echo is coming out during our second candi-

date's visit you need only to be reminded that our <u>third</u> visitor, the Rev. Jared Buss, will be coming on the weekend of February $8^{th} - 10^{th}$. Soon after that your committee will make a recommendation to the bishop and you will be invited to consider and vote on that nomination. This will require a special society meeting, which in turn requires a 7 day notice to all members (either in



print or by electronic mail), so please watch your in-box for that notice. With any "luck" we will know who our next pastor will be by the end of February or the first week of March.

Holy Supper on the 17th

Please note that this will be offered again on the third Sunday, in connection with a sermon on hope. If you would like to be well prepared for this important way of connecting with the Lord please give some thought to the summary of teachings about it in the *New Jerusalem and its Heavenly Doctrine*, no's 210 – 222, which include a virtual compendium of passages also in the *Arcana Caelestia* on the significance of this sacrament. Or see the chapter on it in the *True Christian Religion*, beginning at no. 698.

And here's a thought for you to consider. We have never run out of bread or wine when offering the sacrament. It is quite acceptable to take a significant portion from the plate or the cup; indeed the elements are intended to be savored and enjoyed as a way of expressing our appreciation of the Lord's love and wisdom. While a humble state may suggest a modest portion, the truth is we don't want to limit the Lord's influence on us by being too hesitant. I'll be sure to provide an extra cake of bread on the 17th.

Money Matters

Do you know why the government gives tax relief for donations to churches? It's because churches are recognized as making a significant contribution to the welfare of the nation. In some cases they do naturally charitable work, but in every case they help to motivate people to live selflessly and with integrity. In our case, specifically, we aspire to help people know and love the Lord in His Second Coming, which pretty much covers everything because it leads to "all of the above."

You may or may not benefit directly from a tax deduction for your church donations, but the whole country benefits when the church thrives. Seriously. It does. Directly and indirectly.

Unfortunately we are not all missionaries; we are not all comfortable sharing our faith personally. But we can all contribute to this work by making regular weekly or monthly donations to support those who are, and who make it their *business* to share – through preaching, teaching, organizing, advertising, and all sorts of work on the Internet and social media.

There are two essential uses of the church: mutual support in the faith, and sharing it. To date most of the church's resources have been spent on the former and there hasn't been much left over to do the latter. We can change that if we want to. In other words, if we had the money we could do a LOT more for other people.

Please remember to consider the church in your monthly budget. And if you have particular ideas about what you think might work best for the growth of this congregation, PLEASE, let's talk! We look forward to hearing from you.

From the Principal

January took us past the half-way point of the school year. The month also included (or will include) our Emanuel Swedenborg banquet and skating outing and for some, the *Cognitive Abilities Test*. Hosting visiting pastors in January and February has been a fun bonus for the students. They appreciate a novel presenter for chapel and were quite engaged after chapel as Rev. Mac Frazier spoke with them about the finer points of Texas barbeque and Rev. Mark Allais talked with them about his native South Africa. The Rev. Jared Buss will be visiting in 2 weeks.

I want to share a couple thoughts on what goes into religious education in a New Church classroom. On paper, we have all the students working through a series of curricula taken directly from different parts of the Word, organized systematically, K through 12 and in each case, accommodated by the teacher to the age and prior knowledge of the students. Of course, there are bumps in the road, but we work really hard at this."

In January, Mike and I have each substituted in the 7/8th grade classroom as Rev. Ferrell continues with his recovery. It happens that this is the section of the curriculum that asks us to bring in some teachings about the love in marriage. What a great opportunity! This love is the precious jewel of human life, it's the container for the true Christian religion and, as the highest of loves gifted to us from the Lord it holds the promise of the greatest delights and happiness that He can offer us. This is an area where the New Church has many important principles which we long to impart to the students. It also happens to touch on some of the most sensitive and controversial topics.

We're told that men and women are completely distinguishable from each other and also designed to be completely complementary to each other. While no two couples are the same, human marriages all are intended to reflect the spiritual marriage of love and wisdom which flows from the Lord. Not surprisingly, we can find ample evidence of differences between men and women at psychological and physical levels, differences in interests, tendencies, strengths etc. which can make for a beautifully balanced partnership.

But we're in an age where anything smacking of traditional gender norms or marriage has been thrown up for question and for individual interpretation. Which means that we have a challenge and a great opportunity in the classroom. We have to adjust the tone and approach, while helping the students clearly see, and hopefully appreciate, the beautiful teachings of the church. We're well aware of the cultural wash of changing, pressing views they are receiving and will receive and so we believe it is all the more important to share a religious perspective on what human marriage and sexuality can be, so that the students aren't left merely with the latest trend in secular thought. We definitely don't do it perfectly, but it is a great privilege to work with the students to find the right language and examples which help them make sense of the teachings the Lord has given us.



January Report of Pastor Search Committee

In mid-January the Search Committee entertained and interviewed two of the three candidates for the position of Pastor of the WNC Society. Rev. Mac Frazier was first, and after spending the day at the school was able to deliver a well-attended Friday evening doctrinal class. He then spent three hours on Saturday morning meeting with the committee to discuss his background and his views on pastoral duties as well as the opportunities and challenges of our Society. After an evening social gathering with committee and Board members and spouses, he presided over the Sunday morning Church service before heading back to Glenview.

At the end of January, Rev. Mark Allais and his wife Karen visited the Society for 6 days of meetings, school visits, tours of the area, and social events before returning to their home in Johannesburg, South Africa. Since it is now summer season there, their visit to cold and windy Washington (and colder Kitchener, Ontario) was a bit of a shock, but appeared to be managed well by both of them. Mark spent Thursday and Friday at the school, delivered the address at the Swedenborg Birthday banquet on Friday evening, interviewed the Committee on Saturday morning, and presided over the Sunday morning Church service. They returned to South Africa on Tuesday.

The Committee has one more candidate to interview, and then will meet in mid-February to work on its recommendations to Bishop Keith. Please feel free to communicate your thoughts about this process to any committee member.

Library Report January 2018 to January 2019

The non-fiction section of the School Library has long been in need of judicially discarding some of our books. Together with Ivy Radcliffe's help, I went through some 2000 volumes and discarded 869. The criteria for discard were as follows: condition of book, whether the information was current, how often it was taken out and whether the information was useful to our students.

The books that might be sold were boxed up and left behind the Public Library where they would be sorted. The others we placed in the large bins for discarded books.

Amanda Hyatt has been working almost every school day to attack the momentous task of digitizing the library card catalog. Her report is as follows.

"We are about midway through the process of digitizing the library card catalog. Digitizing the catalog means that for each book, the information one would find in the catalog, is entered into a data base via library management software. If additional information is available online, such as a book summary or subjects, this information is also entered. The software then assigns each book an ID and a scan-able barcode. Barcode labels are printed and applied to each book. Once the digitization is complete teachers and students will be able to search the catalog from any work station in the school for which access has been granted. They will also be given library cards, and will then check books out electronically using a barcode scanner."

I am grateful for the continued help of Mary Cooper, Jean Allen and Amanda Hyatt who continue to do Thursdays in spite of her other commitment.
