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From the Pastor

As I write this, we just got another alert from the Governor of Maryland, this time upgrading things to a full-blown Stay at Home Order. Not surprisingly, this has put a damper on our activities as a church, and adds layers of extra challenge to our goals of helping people find meaning, purpose and connection.

But we're making it happen. I have been extremely impressed by all the efforts I've seen from staff, faculty, volunteers and individual church members and school parents to find alternative means of worshipping together, learning from the Lord's Word together, educating children, and lovingly caring for and serving one another. Keep up the hard and creative work! We are getting through this, and we are doing it **together**.

We have begun having regular Sunday worship services via YouTube video at our regular time of 11:00 a.m. We are starting to use Zoom for online gatherings of church people, for religious, social, and business purposes. Our teachers are using a collection of various online tools combined with the judicious use of physical packets of materials to continue to teach their students. And everyone is washing their hands and disinfecting surfaces a whole lot more than they used to.

1.2. Is your building open?

No. In accordance with guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and from our parent denomination the General Church of the New Jerusalem, and in cooperation with executive orders issued by the Governor of the State of Maryland, the facilities Washington New Church and School are closed to the public. The one exception, in accordance with the latest Governor's latest Executive Order, is that our vestibule is open from time to time for the purpose of distributing educational materials to our students.

1.3. Are you still operating?

Yes. Although our facilities are closed, we are continuing to perform our primary uses as a church and school, just by alternative means.

1.4. When will you reopen?

We wish we knew, but right now we don't, other than it likely won't be sooner than April 27th. We continue to monitor Federal, State and Local authorities, and will update when we know more.

1.5. What about yoga classes, Forested events, or other third-party uses of the facilities?

Any events or gatherings that were scheduled to take place inside the church building over the next two weeks (at least) will have to be postponed. 3. School-Specific Questions

3.1. How should I pick up and drop off materials for my student?

All materials should be picked up and dropped off in our front entrance. The vestibule area just inside our main entrance will be open 8:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m. M - F. Parents can enter the vestibule during these times, but all other doors will be locked. Teachers will notify parents of any packets or work to be picked up. Our teachers take care to prepare packets in a safe manner and the vestibule is cleaned and sanitized daily. Gloves, disinfecting wipes and disposable gloves are available in the vestibule for parent use. When leaving the area, you can help us keep the space safe by taking a wipe and wiping down the door handles.

3.2. Is it really legal to pick up materials in person, now that we are under a Stay at Home order?

As of the latest Executive Order from the Governor of Maryland, yes. Order Number 20-03-30-01 states that

"All persons living in the State of Maryland are hereby ordered, effective as of 8:00 p.m. on March 30, 2020, to stay in their homes or places of residences ("Homes") except: to conduct or participate in Essential Activities..." (II.a.1),

... and includes in the list of Essential Activities,

"Traveling to and from an educational institution for purposes of receiving meals or **instructional materials** for distance learning...." (II.b.4)

3.3. Who do I call if I cannot reach my child's teacher?

Call our secretary at 301-518-3628. Bonnie will try to help you to resolve your issue or reach a teacher who can.

3.4. Is my child still getting an education?

Yes. There is no question that suddenly moving everything to home-based distance learning is not ideal. It puts large demands on parents and requires students and teachers to adapt quickly to unideal circumstances. However, the structure of ongoing expectations and engagement with content over a variety of media will support each student in continuing to develop in core academic areas. The possible alternative of 5.5 months out of school raises serious concerns about developmental time lost for the students; a phenomena known as "summer brain drain" which shows a pattern of academic regression for students if they are not kept engaged with academic and enrichment activities.

3.5. Is my child required to participate in distance learning?

Short answer: yes. These are strange circumstances; the education of millions of American students has been disrupted. The public system in our county is lagging, even as it attempts to offer distance learning on a large scale. It seems likely that many allowances will be made for the irregular school year, however, the expectation and requirement that children participate in school remains. WNCS is committed to offering the best distance-education program we can during this period of disruption. Our goal and expectation is still to prepare every student possible for advancement to the next grade, and to do that we need full, active participation in the program set by the teachers.

3.6. What if we lack the resources at home (technological or available adult supervision)?

PLEASE communicate with your home room teacher if you are struggling to meet an expectation at home. This situation places a significant burden on parents. We recognize this and aim to be responsive and supportive of the needs that arise. We will work to adapt the expectation to the reality of the support available at home and, where possible, provide technological resources.

From the Principal

It is difficult to know where to begin communication during these weird and increasingly difficult times. Perhaps I should start with an area of admiration and appreciation.

Our teachers, are working longer, rather than shorter hours at the



moment. We enjoyed a one-week reprieve for Spring Break, before ramping up a distance learning program for all the students. In this our school is actually ahead of the public systems around us which don't expect to be up to speed for a couple more weeks. For us, this has required learning new tools for live interaction as well as documents exchange and coordination. It has required lots of communication with all the families, to help them through the new tools and expectations. Most of all it has required patience and a human touch, reaching out to the students individually, helping them to still feel connected to their teachers and work.

On a similar note, I am very grateful for all the work that parents have invested in managing and facilitating their children's education at home. Some of the parents are out of work, and starting to struggle financially as a result, and some are called into high-stress medical jobs. None of them were planning to switch to homebased education. Hat's off to them for their efforts, their positive attitudes and affirmations of the work the teachers are doing.

Fully online education is not balanced or complete education. This obviously wasn't our plan. However, we believe that with focus and hard work, the students can continue to learn core material, and progress through their current academic year. Being completely off school for 5.5 months till next fall is not a good option, as it would exacerbate the risk of "summer brain-drain" demonstrated in educational research.

Our small organization depends on tuition income, charitable donations and endowment payout. All three of these sources is threatened by these difficult economic conditions so we do expect some hard years in front of us. The boards and administration will be doing the best we can to be prudent in our responses, but our intention is to keep our people employed through the crisis.

We have created a single FAQ document (see p.3) for the church and school to address current procedures and issues arising from the virus. This document will be updated on an ongoing basis. It is available from both the church and school websites and our school Facebook page.

One aspect of this crisis that strikes us as unusual, is that many people are left *less* busy than they would like to be and at the same time there are very limited opportunities to help each other out. The increase in connection calls and video conferences is one bright side, to an otherwise isolating experience. Watching the teachers make individual phone and video connections with each of the families leaves me grateful for the small and personal nature of our school.

MORE ABOUT TITHING

In March, in the article on tax relief we mentioned the principle of the tithe, that is, of giving 10% of one's income to the church, and we noted that while the New Church does not insist on a *literal* 10%, the tithe represents ALL, and is an acknowledgment of the fact that *everything* we have is from the Lord. The number therefore

represents ALL that we are able to give back for the support of the church. And yes, we are **commanded** to give that amount.

The question we are left to answer, then, is how we can know whether we are giving all that we can, *especially in this season of a health pandemic,* or whether we are keeping too much for ourselves. Obviously, in keeping with the laws of Providence, no one can determine that for us; we have to figure it out for ourselves. But there are some questions we can ask ourselves in the process, for example,

- 1. How much "stuff" do we really need?
- 2. To what extent do our wealth and comfort insulate us from an awareness of our *spiritual* needs *or those of others?*
- 3. Realistically, what can we afford to sacrifice for others who are more needy, or for the church in its present predicament?
- 4. And finally, how much faith do we have that the Lord will provide for us if we put Him first in our budgets?

It is important to know that our giving is not for nothing. Every dollar that is contributed has the potential to help someone – possibly many people – grow closer to the Lord and heaven.

In Malachi 3:10 we read, "Bring all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be food in My house, and try Me now in this,' says the Lord of hosts, 'If I will not open for you the windows of heaven and pour out for you such blessing that there will not be room enough to receive it."

Our condolences to the high school and college and other students now home from far and wide and attending classes online or trying to figure out how to graduate and get on with their lives. Usually the end of classes is a time for congratulations and joyful returns to a summer of jobs and vacations, rather than descent into that infamous place known as quarantine. This end-ofyear will be memorable for a vastly different reason and will find its own place in the history books – without balloons or cigars or photos.

It was fortunate that the **WNCS play, Robin Hood,** was done early this year. It turned out to be the grand finale, as always, to the end of the season of regular classes! And it was a <u>marvelous</u> production, much thanks to Jana Sprinkle and her small army of aids.
