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#### From the Pastor

Lately, one of my favorite questions has been, "What's the first thing you want to do when they 'blow the All Clear' and end social distancing?" I've had a lot of answers from different people.

Many say they want to hug an older relative, or play with a grandchild. Some who have had to avoid stores because of their health or age have said they want to shop for themselves again. Others talk about sites they'd visit, favorite restaurants they'd go to, or parties they'd throw. One family wants to travel to another country to see relatives once that's safe again.

I've heard from teens who want to go out and hang with their squad, kids who want to go to the zoo, sports fans who want to go to a game (or even just to sit and watch a live game on television again), and moms who want to take their kids to a playground.

I know several people--myself included--who have "get a haircut" at the top of the list. My wife wants to play hockey again, and that's pretty high on my list as well. Even just skating on a rink would be nice at this point for me.

And there are also people who have delayed eye doctor appointments, vacations, and visits to relatives they worry they may not see again. And more than one person has said to me they want to go back to church.

And this got me thinking about the story of the end of The Flood, a symbolic story about a time of spiritual struggle for the church. When Noah, representing the church, finally emerged from the



shelter of the ark and onto dry ground, his first act was to build an altar to the Lord and offer burnt offerings as a sign of worship. This is what I would like to do as a church community, once we can responsibly, safely and legally congregate again.

I don't know when it will happen, but when it does, let's plan for a special service to celebrate. Someone suggested we buy pizza for everyone and have lunch and a party after worship. Inspired by the "burnt offerings" theme, I think maybe a serious barbecue might be in order. We'll have to see.

#### **E-Giving: Just a Gentle Reminder**

Folks, since we can't "come" to church during the pandemic, and sending donations by mail is tedious, we thought this might be a good time to walk you through our online donation process.

Of course it goes without saying that *any* donations at this time may be problematic, and we certainly understand that. But if you

have the means and would like to take advantage of this very simple, secure and easy process, here's how.

Simply open up the WNC website at <a href="www.TheWNC.org">www.TheWNC.org</a>, and scroll down to the lower right-hand corner of the home page where you will see an invitation to DONATE. There is a link, just below, to a 2-minute tutorial that explains the simple steps needed to register to make a donation.

Now, back to the original DONATE button. You can make a donation right there without further ado, but to make it easy for the treasurer to track for tax purposes we suggest you use the "donor portal" (in blue just below the "Go" button). Once in the donor portal you can register an account. Simply click the "sign in" button and then click "register." Once registered you can choose to make your donation ONE TIME, or RECURRING, and if you choose the latter, be assured that you can change it at any time going forward. Finally, at the end you will see a "submit" button. Click that and you're finished, and you will almost instantly receive an email confirmation of your gift.

Again, we appreciate that you may not be in a position to contribute during this social and economic crisis, but if you *are* able to do so, we invite you to consider this convenient option.

Meanwhile, let us take this moment also to thank you for your ongoing care and support of the church in *any* of the ways that you do this: attending groups and classes on-line, calling to support one another, and generously helping with a host of community uses.

## From the Principal,

I don't have many updates from our empty school building, but I can let you know that WNCS continues to operate. Our teachers, parents and students have been making great efforts to continue through the spring term; all of them working very hard.

The teachers have had to adapt new technological solutions for de-



livering their curriculum from a distance, while aiming for the fine balance of maintaining as much of the program as possible without overwhelming the families. We reduced some of the content,

and made some portions optional but the bulk of the core offerings are still underway.

Our parents have had to balance their work life while also acting as home-schooling support – which includes guiding, motivating and organizing their children.

The students are adapting to wide open schedules, which still include plenty of work which needs to be handed in on time, without the aid of teachers and bells to organize their time.

On the positive front, we have given all students uniform free days for the rest of the year!

More seriously, we have offered some flexibility (and minor reductions) in tuition payment schedules for families who need it.

Many, likely a large majority of American students, are not currently engaged with school at this point. Our large public school systems report low-attendance and participation rates in their attempted online school programs. Many are also quite restricted by what they can offer and require, given that they cannot guarantee that all students have equal access. By contrast, we are extremely

blessed. Our teachers are doing their best to make a clear and manageable program available to the families and the families are showing up and fighting their way through the logistical challenges in an admirable fashion.

In our faculty meetings, we have begun laying out schedules and plans for next year with the hope and expectation that school will resume as normal. Based on information available in June, we will also develop alternatives and contingency plans as necessary. We now have only one month till graduation. We will be looking for appropriate ways to honor and congratulate our graduates and their families, even if we are not allowed large gatherings by early June.

This past Sunday our pastor Mac Frazier gave the 2<sup>nd</sup> of his three part series on Happiness. The primary point he made was how important useful service is to our happiness.

Needless to say, many of us right now feel unable to perform useful service except to

our family or those living within our homes. He posed the question, "What are some ways a church community, whether as a group or as individuals, can usefully serve others during this economic and health crisis we are in, without the ability to physically gather together in one place?" Looking at the news these days you see stories of groups, some small family groups and some larger religious and civic groups finding ways to be of service to their community.

What about us? Can we form small social distancing or virtual groups to reach out? Of course we can. But Mac was not posing the question so that he or the Trustees or secretary would put something into action. He was seeing small groups and individuals already reaching out and encouraging more of the same. Delightfully, we do have some church folk who are finding ways to be of service – like Amanda Hyatt, Ginny Gladish and Nancy Alford who are making masks for individuals and hospitals or Bill Kunkle

making face shields and distributing them. Also, Sarah Smith, Emily Martin and Janna Zuber shopping for those who can't. I'm sure there are more. This is not only useful service to others but also an antidote to the loneliness, boredom and unhappiness many are feeling.

Mac also reminded us that doing our daily work *is* useful service. I am a big fan of Swedenborg's Rules of life and this is one of my favorites — "... to attend faithfully to one's office and other duties; and in addition, to make one's self useful to society in general." I sat down one day to make a list of the people associated with our little society that not only 'attend faithfully' to their work but put themselves at risk doing so, (which is also "laying down one's life for one's friends"). 


#### Then there is sad news:

Owen has a great deal of anxiety all the time, and Covid-19 is scary for him. Edward and Wystan report that they feel chill about it. (Lucky them!) They have had lots of fun helping to clean up and reclaim the cemetery under Eugene Cole's direction, as a regular part of their Sunday afternoon.
