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From the Pastor

Election Day this year is November 3rd, just a few days after this issue of *The Echo* goes out. But really, with all the early and mailin voting happening due to the pandemic, October has also been election *month*. Many of you may have already voted by the time you read this. I, myself, will be voting some time today or tomorrow, depending on how my day goes after writing this article.

So, I thought, since this year is a major election year, that it would be a good time to review some of what the Heavenly Doctrines have to say about government. Don't worry, as a pastor, I will never tell you who to vote for. But the Word does offer principles that ought to guide each person's thinking as they ponder their options.

The following are all taken from the concluding chapter of *New Jerusalem and Its Heavenly Doctrines*, under the heading of "Ecclesiastical and Civil Government".

First, we read that civil government is necessary and good:

Order cannot be kept in the world without having governors to note everything that happens according or contrary to order, rewarding those who live orderly lives and punishing those who are disorderly. Failing this, the human race will inevitably perish. For everyone inherits by birth a tendency to wish to rule over others and to possess other people's goods. This leads to quarrels, envy, hatred, revenge, deceit, cruelty and many other evils. Therefore, unless people were kept under restraint by laws, and by rewards suited to their loves, (which are honors and gains) for those who do goods, and by punishments contrary to those loves (which are the loss of honors, of possessions, and of life) for those who do evils, the human race would perish.

So there must be governors to keep human societies in order. They must be learned in the law, wise and God-fearing. There must also be order among governors, to prevent any of them, out of a whim or out of ignorance, from permitting evils that are contrary to order, thus destroying it. This is guarded against by having governors of higher and lower rank, so that one is subordinate to another.

...The governors people have in charge of affairs which relate to the world, that is, affairs of state, are called magistrates. The highest of these, where such systems of government exist, is the king. (n. 312-313, 314)

Now, we do not have kings as part of our system of government, but it seems reasonable to apply teachings regarding the role of kings to other heads of state as well, such as to our President. So in the following, where we read "kings" or "royalty", I am inclined to also include "heads of state" and "the authority and honor of the office":

A king (leader) who looks upon the laws as above him attributes royalty to the law, and the law is his master. For he knows that law is justice, and all justice which is truly justice is Divine.

...Kings and magistrates are in charge of affairs concerning civil law and justice.

Since the king cannot by himself control everything, governors are needed to rule under him. Each of these has an area to control, where the king's ability or power is lacking. These governors taken together make up the total administra-

tion, headed by the king himself.

Royalty does not reside in the person but is assigned to the person. A king who believes that the royalty resides in his person, and a governor who believes that the rank of governor resides in his person, is unwise.

Royalty consists in governing in accordance with the kingdom's laws, and in judging justly in accordance with them. A king who looks upon the laws as above him is wise; one who looks upon himself as above the laws is not. A king who looks upon the laws as above him attributes royalty to the law, and the law is his master. For he knows that law is justice, and all justice which is truly justice is Divine. One, however, who regards himself as above the laws, attributes royalty to himself and either believes himself to be the law or the law which is justice to be from himself. Thus he claims for himself what is God's, when he ought to be subject to it.

The law which is justice ought to be passed by the wise and God-fearing legislators in the kingdom, and thereafter both

the king and his subjects ought to live in accordance with it. A king who lives in accordance with a law that has been passed, and in this sets his subjects an example, is truly king. (n. 319-323)

I think I will leave it at that, and let the Word speak for itself. I only ask that whenever you vote for officials of our civil government, that you take these ideas into account; and also that you keep in mind that the civil government is necessary, but also not particularly spiritual. Above the level of civil law (which government oversees), there is moral law, and above that the highest law, which is spiritual law. The government of the United States is necessary, but it is far from the government of the Lord.

From the Principal

We just completed the first quarter of this 2020/21 school year. This means midterm reports are going out, followed by parent-teacher conferences – held by video conference.

Despite classes being held at a distance, we can still assess progress in many of the core skill areas. It is more difficult to determine appropriate standards and expectations when we can't evaluate the student's whole-body language and conditions. (Is the student merely goofing off by switching his camera off or is he having genuine connection challenges which cost him 75% lesson?) Similarly, many of the student behaviors on which we normally provide feedback cannot be observed when we're not working with the students in the classroom every day.

The crisis forces both teachers and students to focus in on key priorities and core skills. I don't imagine anyone likes it, but I can see how this has a silver lining. It is a good exercise, from time to time, to be forced to re-evaluate what matters most in a given teaching day, or term or year.

Our school board and faculty have been working on setting the terms under which we will re-open the classrooms. This readiness to re-open includes necessary adaptation of the building, a robust plan, training in our protocols and buy-in from our school families. We will also establish "maximum virus" criteria which our county must drop below for an averaged over 7 days before we can open our doors. We're hoping to have these terms of re-opening laid out and published soon, but even once all our "best laid plans" are in perfect order, we must still wait for the virus to cooperate – so we can't predict when that re-opening will occur.

Teachers have been thinking creatively about how to incorporate occasional on-campus, outdoor lessons which gives the students



and teachers a muchneeded opportunity to establish connections in person. It has also prompted the school to find more useful tie-ins with the Forest Garden, which is an incredible resource right next door. Parents have generally been appreciative; even showing pa-

tience when they pick up their son or daughter only to find them covered with mud.

I want to express gratitude to our volunteer boards for their ongoing attention and support during the crisis and to the very generous, ongoing financial support we receive from church members and friends. In good times, the financial support makes running the school possible but with the extra expenses required in adapting to COVID your support provides a tremendous relief.

White Horse Academy Update:

Our first year out the gate was a successful learning experience for all. We had our first graduate, Siobhan Frazier, who came to us entering her Senior year. While completing her high school requirements, Siobhan pursued driving, ice-skating and cooking lessons as well as shadowing the operations of Forested LLC. Her program also gave her the opportunity to try skills such as installing a toilet, wiring a socket, writing a resume and conducting an interview. She is currently attending the Bryn Athyn College. We had our first freshman, Sohaila Smith, who studied Latin on her own, took Geometry and History online, and pursued English with two mentors locally (a former WNCS teacher and a current part-time teacher). Sohaila also explored several skills from childcare and dog training to animation and sword fighting. Sohaila is currently enrolled as a Sophomore at the White Horse Academy. We have added three Freshmen to our academy, James Frazier, Malik Muhammad and Sophie Hyatt.

This year, we have up to seven in-person yet online classes: History with Mrs. Frazier, Religion with Mr. Frazier, English and Health with Mrs. Sprinkle, Algebra 2 with Mrs. Waelchli, Life skills with Mr. Smith and Art with Mrs. Stillman. Students are taking Physical Science online through Keystone Online School and have been blessed to have multiple volunteers telling us about their careers and career paths. We have explored the process of learning and learning styles and the effects of plastic on the environment and are attempting to recycle plastic bags by crocheting new bags with the aid of Mrs. Janine Smith. Next on our agenda is to make an outdoor worship space for all to enjoy.



There is a nice biographical sketch by son, Jonathan, beginning at about the 47th minute of the recording.



mourned. On Nov.11th please keep him in your thoughts and prayers. \sim Nancy"


