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The Reluctant Prophet

We all have experienced a time in our lives where we struggle to stand up for what we know is right. This is not a new phenomenon. Before us, there were the prophets. There are many examples of prophets reluctant to speak the truth. Think of Moses when he was asked to go and tell Pharaoh to let the Children of Israel go. He made excuse after excuse why he couldn't serve the Lord. He was a reluctant servant.

Think of Elijah. Fleeing from king Ahab and queen Jezebel after killing the prophets of Baal. He runs and hides saying: "LORD, take my life; I am no better than my fathers" (1 Kings 19:4). He thinks that he alone is left, but the Lord doesn't accept that answer and tells him to go back. Elijah was a reluctant servant.

Think of Jeremiah. From his very first call—like Moses before him—he made excuses why it shouldn't be him. "But the Lord said to me: 'Do not say, I am a youth, for you shall go to all to whom I send you, and whatever I command you, you shall speak'" (Jeremiah 1:7). Jeremiah was a reluctant servant.

Think of Jonah. His whole story shows the great lengths at which he would go to in order to avoid speaking the Lord's words to the people of Nineveh. In the end, he does it, but very begrudgingly. Jonah was a reluctant servant.

It isn't always easy to stand for the Lord's Word. Even the prophets were reluctant to stand for the Word. If all these examples weren't enough, the best example is the Lord Himself just a handful of hours before His crucifixion. "Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from Me; nevertheless, not as I will, but as You will" (Matthew 26:39). It almost sounds like Jesus is reluctant.

However, the ending of His statement is what strikes a clear difference in tone: "Not as I will, but as You will."

Though I wish there were time to examine each prophet's story more fully, let's focus on Jeremiah. As said earlier, he started out with excuses. However, even though at times it may have been through gritted teeth, Jeremiah dutifully spoke the Word of the Lord. The following is one of many hostile and dangerous settings that Jeremiah was called to speak to. "This word came from the Lord, saying: 'Stand in the court of the Lord's house, and speak to all the cities of Judah, which come to worship in the Lord's house, all the words that I command you to speak to them. <u>Do not diminish a</u> <u>word</u>. Perhaps everyone will listen and turn from his evil way, **that I may relent** concerning the calamity which I purpose to bring on them because of the evil of their doings.... when Jeremiah had made an end of speaking all that the Lord had commanded him to speak to all the people, that the priests and the prophets and <u>all the people seized</u> <u>him, saying, "You will surely die!"</u> (Jeremiah 26:1-3, 8)

After this, the princes show up—the people with real power—and instead of pleading with them, he turns his words to them as well.

"As for me, here I am, in your hand; do with me as seems good and proper to you. But know for certain that **if you put me to death, you will surely bring innocent blood** on yourselves, on this city, and on its inhabitants; for truly <u>the</u> Lord has sent me to you to speak all these words in your hearing." (Jeremiah 26:14)

It isn't always easy to stand for the Lord's Word. Even the prophets were reluctant to stand for the Word. It should come as no surprise that we too can have difficulty or even just reluctance. But this story in *Jeremiah* is important. As with every truth in the Lord's Word, the Lord's love is inmostly present in all of them (see Apocalypse Revealed 933).

The Lord wants us to hear the Word so we can change. "People caught up in evils and the accompanying falsities cannot be healed by the Word, because they do not read it" (Apocalypse Revealed 936). We need to hear from the Lord. Everyone needs to hear from the Lord. We feel a reluctance to hold fast to the Word. Don't worry, the prophets did too. They came around eventually. Hopefully one day we too can follow the Lord's example and say, "Not as I will, but as You will."

A Clear Idea of God

How clearly developed is your idea of God? How accurately do you feel that you understand the Lord?

Having as "right" idea of God is important, as we read in Divine Love and Wisdom,

How important it is to have a right idea of God can be seen from the fact that the idea of God forms the inmost element of thought in all who have any religion, for all constituents of religion and all constituents of worship relate to God. (*Divine Love & Wisdom* 13)

Have you considered how all your ideas of religion derive from your understanding of the Lord?

I don't think this teaching implies that we're expected to have a complete or flawless understanding of the Divine, but our understanding of Him is very important. So, we should remain curious, humble, and energized in our search to know Him better.

Another one of my favorite teachings about our relationship with the Lord is this one from *True Christian Religion* 787, "Conjunction with an invisible God is like a conjunction of the eye's vision with the expanse of the universe, the limits of which are invisible; it is also like vision in mid-ocean, which reaches out into the air and upon the sea and is lost. Conjunction with a visible God, on the other hand, is like beholding a man in the air or on the sea spreading forth His hands and inviting to His arms."

The first passage spoke about the importance of a correct idea of God because of how it connects to all aspects of religion. This second passage enjoins us to ground our picture of the Lord in the visible human form rather than in an invisible abstraction. We are to picture a loving human standing above the ocean water, with His hands outstretched toward us for an embrace.

Each of us have an idea of the Lord that evolves and changes over our life. Sometimes He may seem to us to be very distant or angry, other times He may seem loving, clear, and present.
