We are pleased to welcome a new kindergarten student to the class. Mrs. Q was complaining that she wasn't working hard enough, so we thought transitioning a new student into the classroom would keep her occupied. ③

Apparently COVID-19 continues to hum along in the background. Most people I talk to seem a wee bit sick of the whole routine by now. However, we continue with our safety protocols, while trying to stay focussed on our reasons for being together. We have had an occasional positive test result but, so far, none that have spread through the school community. When issues do come up, we have friendly and helpful county health department representatives who have been easy to reach while being sympathetic and professional.

The School Board and Board of Trustees have been working on our two scholarship funds: the Waelchli Fund and the Scholarship Fund. Both have grown over the years, and we want to ensure that they can continue to be used effectively to support students at WNCS. At present, WNCS subsidizes all tuitions by about a match of 100% and this total cost is still far beyond the scope of the scholarship funds.
