## From the Pastor

Well, summer is over, and the school year has resumed. I hope that the change of seasons has been a smooth one for you. As you settle into any new routines that arise at this time of year, I hope you can make room to connect with your neighbors at the church in some new way. Some of you, I know, are deeply involved in many areas of the life of the church already. But many more just have one or

maybe two points of connection right now, but possibly would benefit from a little more. So here are some ways you can become more involved.

First off, as you know, we operate a **school**. In addition to enrolling your children, there are other ways to get involved. We always welcome volunteers to help out in various ways. Maybe you'd enjoy being an occasional substitute teacher. Or sharing your passion for sports and fitness by helping with our PE program.

But of course, we are way more than a school. We are a church, first and foremost, and a central part of the life of the church is our weekly worship gatherings on Sundays. You can watch them online at our **YouTube** channel at

www.youtube.com/c/WashingtonNewChurch. We are regularly improving our online offering, but there will always be an aspect of the congregational **worship** experience that can only really be fully enjoyed in person; so, if you have been mainly an online worshiper, maybe make a plan to come in person some time soon.

And beyond listening to sermons online and participating in worship in person, you can connect more deeply by volunteering to help make those things happen. I am always looking for more people to join the **worship team** that includes **video** operators, **chancel** attendants, **ushers**, and **food** or **coffee** volunteers. Don't worry if you have no idea how to do any of these jobs, because all of them—even operating the video system—are very easy to learn.

In addition to those jobs, I am also looking for people who want to contribute to our worship as part of the **music team**. Over the summer, we began putting together a musical program to enrich your worship experience, with a group of musicians meeting regularly to work on musical arrangements, to rehearse pieces, and to make plans for an expanded music program, and now we are ready to start rolling out the early fruits of those efforts. In fact, this coming Sunday as I write, we will have a special musical offering at the end of the service, featuring a beautiful rendition of Psalm 23, set to music by New Church member Tony Rose.

We have much more planned. Consider being a part of this. In addition to singers and instrumentalists, we also could really use some volunteers to help with setting up, balancing, and monitoring our **sound** using the new mixer and sound equipment we are installing.

Besides Sunday morning worship gatherings, we also have various learning groups that meet throughout the month for the purpose of studying the Word, learning from one another, and connecting more as a church community. Every other Monday night, our **book reading group** meets online to discuss a book we've been reading. Currently, the topic is the book, *Apocalypse Revealed*, which is all about the deeper meaning behind the *Book of Revelation*.

During the upcoming holiday season, we will have a **Christmas Story group** where we get together to read through one of the accounts of the first Christmas. Then, as we approach **Easter**, we will do the same but with one of the various Gospel accounts of the events surrounding Lord's crucifixion and resurrection. Unlike the regular book reading group, there is no homework for these holiday groups.

In addition to those groups, we are starting a new kind of group in October for **married couples**. The purpose of the group is to create a supportive environment for couples to think and talk about what it means to be married, and how to enjoy true married love. There won't be any homework for this group, and it is not a marriage therapy group. Rather, couples will get together to share stories, discuss interesting questions, and celebrate one another. To begin with, we will meet on the fourth Tuesday of each month, but the schedule and frequency may change in response to people's desires once the group gets going.

We also have groups that get together purely to have fun with one another. Our **volleyball** group has been going strong for some time now. During the warmer months, they play outdoors by the church on Wednesdays. When things get colder (think November), they often move indoors. Last year, the winter indoor volleyball happened on Mondays, but this year that might change. Because of

the shifting schedule, contact Assistant Pastor Brian Smith if you're interested in playing.

Also on Wednesdays, there's a group that gathers outdoors around a **fire** to hang out together and enjoy conversations, both serious and silly. No agenda, no plan, everyone just shows up and has a good time.

And speaking of gathering to have a good time, there are of course various **parties** and gatherings that happen from time to time, especially around holidays. But we don't have to wait for a special occasion to enjoy one another's company. In fact, if you would like to either host or organize a party of some kind—whether a picnic, a dinner, a celebration, a game night, or a singing contest or whatever you like—and would like some help with location or organization, let me know! Not only do I love a good party, but I have a professional, pastoral interest in helping you to help others make stronger connections with one another as a community. Just let me know what you're thinking, and we'll go from there.

Oh, and I nearly forgot! Our newest community group is a gathering of folks who go on **walks and hikes** of various kinds. They had their first outing just a couple of Sunday afternoons ago. You can read all about them in a separate article in this issue of the Echo p.9.

And speaking of outdoors, we have opportunities for outdoor **gardening and weeding**, as well as other maintenance around our church and school campus. We also have a need for volunteers for various maintenance work within the buildings, too. A great way (but not the only way) to participate in this useful work is to come to one of our **work party** days. We usually have a pancake breakfast to kick off these Saturday morning groups, and then divide off to work in teams and as individuals getting all sorts of stuff done that needs to be done so we can continue to operate.

Not an outdoors kinda person? No problem! We are also always looking for people to help serve behind the scenes on our boards and committees. Two areas we are especially looking for volunteers for right now are our **Investment Committee** and our

**Contributions Committee**. No special training is needed for either role, and you don't have to be a member of the board of trustees to serve on a committee. All you need is a willingness to help the church be financially responsible, and a willingness to learn how to contribute to that from existing committee members.

Finally, in addition to volunteering to help the church be the church, you can also volunteer alongside your church neighbors for projects that **help those outside of ourselves**. Most recently we've begun working with organizations that help set up refugees moving into our area with furniture and other household items in their new homes. If this kind of work interests you, let me know and we'll be sure to let you know of the next such opportunity that arises.

So, as you see, there are many different ways you can engage with the church, as a participant, as a volunteer, and even as a leader or organizer. Dates and times for all of them are in the calendar in the *Echo*. If you have any questions, please let me know.

In this era of increasing social disconnect, I encourage you to take a step in improving your emotional and spiritual health by trying out one of these ways of connecting with your neighbors at the church. You will be doing yourself a service, and you will also be embodying what it means to be a follower of the Lord, by serving others with your presence.

Dear Friends,

Last month the ceiling in my living room collapsed on everything below (which at the time included one of my two cats,) burying everything in a couple of feet of very dusty pink insulation and large heavy slabs of shattered drywall.

What did I do? Naturally, I called Bonnie. In a short time, she and Brian arrived with a box of very large heavy-duty trash bags, and when they had finished, what remained of the ceiling was propped up with two-by-fours and the debris was neatly stacked or bagged in the driveway. weeks the ceiling had been restored, everything had been mended and repainted, and I was left, a bit dazed, shaking my head in wonder and astonishment.

My home is whole again. And every night I thank The Lord for the working of His Divine Providence

through the kindness and generosity of spirit of the members of His Church.



Hurstville New Church is celebrating 100 years in Penshurst! In 1905 the Hurstville Society of the New Church, outside Sydney, Australia, was founded (some may remember our 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration in

2005?). In 1921 the Society went from having no permanent place of worship to purchasing a block of land and erecting a simple

building on Dudley Street. The cornerstone was laid in July 1921, and on November 27, 1921, the church building was dedicated.

Covid derailed us a bit — but we'll be celebrating the momentous anniversary of the church dedication with a weekend of centenary celebrations *this* year, and you're invited! There will be an open house with afternoon tea alongside open gardens and tennis court on Saturday, November 12<sup>th</sup>. On Sunday, November 13<sup>th</sup>, there will be a special worship service followed by a celebratory luncheon.
