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From the Pastor

The reason why 'an aroma' means that which is pleasing and acceptable, and so why in the Jewish Church an aroma was also representative of that which is pleasing and is ascribed to Jehovah or the Lord, is that good stemming from charity,

and the truth of faith deriving from charity, correspond to sweet and pleasant aromas. (Secrets of Heaven 925)

As we mark our calendars for the month of June, we approach a day of significance to our spiritual community - New Church Day. This year we will celebrate on Sunday, June 18th. New Church Day commemorates the inception of the New Christian movement that began on June 19, 1770. This year, as we did last year, we will be celebrating the occasion with a blend of worship, community, and great food!

Following our New Church Day family festival service at 11:00 a.m., we will be gathering together at 4:00 p.m. for a potluck picnic. A time to gather as a community, to share in the warmth of fellowship, and to have fun together as a community. And yes, I will be providing an abundance of smoked barbecue. You are also encouraged to bring a food offering. Vegetable dishes, sides, drinks, and desserts are especially welcome, but more meat entrees are good, too! But if you came to the barbecue the school hosted last month and noticed that my ribs went away alarmingly quickly, just know that my plans for June 18th are considerably scaled up. Now, some of you might ask, "Is Mac secretly working on a plan to stop pastoring so he can become a full-time pitmaster?" Do not fear! No retirement plan nor side-gig is in the works. In fact, I believe smoking ribs, pulled pork and brisket are quite complementary with the work of a religious professional! Looked at in a certain light, the art of barbecue shares some interesting parallels with



the process of regeneration as described in the Word.

In barbecuing, we start with raw, tough cuts of meat that historically have been considered the "cheap" cuts. Using normal cooking methods, they tend to produce not so great food, in large part because of all the tough connective tissue they contain. But through the patient application of low heat and smoke, the meat's collagen gradually breaks down into gelatins and water, making the meat tender, and when combined with smoke, rendered fat and seasonings (mainly salt), quite flavorful. This transformative process mirrors the slow yet profound processes of spiritual reformation and regeneration, where our inner selves gradually evolve to become more loving and wise, through a combination of separating out evils and falsities and then marrying goods and truths to one another.

And all the elements of barbecue are quite Biblical, of course...

In the Word, smoke is often associated with worship (especially in the burning of incense, but also in the meat offerings at the Tabernacle and Temple). Smoke itself can represent something bad (like certain kinds of false beliefs) and also something good (primarily a perception that comes with prayer). Perhaps when cooking with smoke, it can be seen as akin to divine influx in our lives that heightens our perception of spiritual things. Much like smoke subtly imbues the meat with character and depth, the Lord flows into us with His Wisdom subtly yet continuously, shaping us, molding us, and adding depth to our perception of the truths we learn externally.

Traditional barbecue cooks and flavors using wood smoke, specifically. Wood is a symbol of natural good. And in barbecue, not all woods are created equal. Some will impart a bitter taste. Others will burn too hot and too quickly. Likewise, not all natural good is effective in our regeneration. But if we use the proper wood—natural good from a spiritual origin—the Lord brings about wonderful results.

Most of the work of barbecuing isn't done by the smoke itself, but by the slow, gentle heat. Heat and fire are, of course, symbols of love. Just as the Lord's love is patient and gentle, aiming at transforming, not destroying us, to make us into something new, the tough cuts of meat we barbecue need cooking at much lower temperatures and over considerably longer times than one would use, for instance, to grill a steak. Personally, when I think of my spiritual journey, I'm much more interested in being smoked than being grilled.

There are even many places in the Word which describe a "sweet aroma" that is "pleasing to the Lord", in connection with various sacrifices, primarily the burning of incense, and the burnt offerings of meat. Meat offerings in the Old Testament were animal sacrifices—symbols of handing over our own base affections and desires to the Lord so that He could transform them into something holy and spiritual. This spiritual work is a form of worship and is indeed pleasing to the Lord.

I could go on, but I'm getting hungry.

Anyway, as we gather this New Church Day, let's celebrate not only the historic founding of the New Christian era but also our ongoing participation with one another in our little New Church society here in Mitchellville. Let's embrace the symbolic parallels of our barbecue, savoring the taste of community, patience, and transformation. I look forward to seeing you all on June 18th, at our worship service and our picnic. Until then, may your days be filled with love, wisdom, and perhaps a touch of pleasing aroma from a loaded smoker.

"Then Aaron's sons shall burn it on the altar on top of the burnt offering, which is on the wood on the fire; it is a food offering with a pleasing aroma to the LORD." (*Leviticus* 3:5)

School Report

Thus ends another year of school. This one had a full and positive end. We had our first ever plant sale which launched a multi-year fundraising campaign for

playground improvements. It was a successful community event and likely to be repeated. Our talent night (hosted by the high school) and our community BBQ each also drew large numbers of friendly participants.

As I write, we are headed into the last week of school and looking forward to our school closing ceremony and 6-12th grade musical. At school closing we will recognize Brent Hyatt as our long-term service award winner. He has given countless hours to the vitally important, though almost invisible task, of managing, interpreting, and explaining our budget and finances. He is careful, thoughtful, and clear – all things one needs in a treasurer. But Brent is also efficient and brief in his remarks, which makes him deeply appreciated during otherwise long board meetings.

We awarded Faculty appreciation awards to Kai Smith, Shaunti Smith and Anelka Anderson and our Levi Cowley Sportsmanship award to Bryce Assan. We also recognized Shaunti's excellent scholarship with a Justin D. Zuber award. Further, we recognized the following students with service awards: James Frazier (organized school-wide ping pong tournament), Marcellus Smith (accompanied chapel) Kai and Shaunti (organized and hosted the school talent night) and Alana Rhone for Spirit Week.

I am very grateful to all the efforts of parents, students, and teachers to stay focussed and working through the year. At this stage, the fatigue is palpable, but the successes are also clear. Our student body has been generally positive and friendly with each other this year and this kindness and decency is a blessing for the whole school community. Indeed, our theme for the year is to "be a blessing" as the Lord promised to Abraham in Genesis 26.4.

This was our final year of a WNCS high school (at least in the short term). Started in 1972, it has run successfully for 5 decades! To meet the changing needs from our families we made the shift in 2019 to a flexible, 4-year program, rather than the previous 2-year program which prepared students to head to the Academy of the New Church. This new approach ran into COVID complications and failed to attract sufficient students to sustain its operations into the future. However, it has still been a great pleasure to work with the students who it served in those years and to take advantage of the program's flexibility to set up work experiences, trips, service opportunities and student choice in subject material.

Reflecting back on the 50 years of WNCS high school, I think of the fact that Mrs. Waelchli oversaw the first 10th grade graduating class in 1977 and has kept teaching until she could also serve the 2022/23 high school students in geometry and Algebra 1.

I also think of my (much shorter window) of 8 years working at WNCS. Thanks to the high school program, I had the opportunity to overlap with the tail end of Jordan Kinsey's schooling at WNCS, and now, with the beginning of her full-time work here. We are very pleased to welcome her to join the team for the coming 2023/24 year as a "floating, multipurpose-teacher-of-many-grades-and-talents."

And speaking of multiple talents and assignments, one further retrospective brings me to our much beloved colleague and friend, Jana Hyatt Sprinkle. I emphasize her middle "Hyatt," because it was under this name that she began at WNCS as a student many years ago. In fact, it was her older brother who was part of the very first WNCS 10th grade class. Between college, marriage, and the raising of her own family she performed all manner of

useful work at WNCS – and sent her own children, Joe, Jennie and Jonathan to WNCS in the 2000s and 20teens. Jana's work with WNCS culminated in 3 years of running the White Horse Academy High School program which she has done with creativity, love, and patience (while still getting enough time away to teach dance and Spanish to the kindergarten). Due to her many years dedicated to WNCS, Jana managed to teach Lincoln Smith in 1992 and has now finished her career working with his daughter in 2023. (We expect all our teachers to span at least a full generation before they can consider a career move).

It raises many mixed feelings to be saying goodbye to Jana and to our high school at the end of this year. It is easy for me to think of loss and all that will be missed. However, the little time I spent looking back over WNCS history I am put more in mind of the fact that nothing that is good is ever lost. All the efforts and successes of both teacher and student over the decades serve useful purposes. These are incorporated by the Lord into the individual's life and used to move that person forward, gradually into greater and greater uses. All of education looks to the future and must always be saying goodbye to our students. That is the purpose of a school – to serve the future usefulness of everyone who passes through the doors.

With that in mind, I have only congratulations and appreciation to offer to Jana Sprinkle and all that she has given WNCS and to the whole WNCS community and all that they have given through 50 years of a wonderful New Church high school.
