## From the Pastor

Does the year feel to you like it's flying by? It seems like only a few days ago we were enjoying eighty-degree weather and sunshine. (Okay, it was only a few days ago. But still...)

Last month I wrote a huge article explaining to you why we are using this year to focus on the future of our school. I explained what motivated me to start this process (our school has evolved away from its original purpose, and I wanted to get affirmation from the society about its new direction), why I'm doing it now (we are in the midst of a big staffing transition), and what I see as the biggest threat to the school's future (the increasing challenge of maintaining an all New Church faculty while maintaining the same number of grades served). If you have not read that article, I *strongly* encourage you to do so now.

Since publishing that article, Brian, and I have moved forward with steps to collect input from various groups on what the school should look like five years from now and how we should go about getting there. We have had discussions on the topic with the School Board, and the Board of Trustees. We have also met with all of the faculty and staff in small groups, and I have been discuss-

ing it with the Pastor's Council.

Currently, I am having one-onone conversations with individuals in the church society. If I have not heard from you yet, I encourage you to reach out to let me know what you think about the

school and its future. I have been sending out email invites, with a special focus on folks who are a part of the church but who are not already part of the groups mentioned above, looking to have conversations in person, or via email, phone, or video. But don't feel you have to wait for an email invite if you have something you want to share. I want to hear from everyone.

The plan is to gather as much input as possible before going back to the faculty as a group with what Brian and I have learned by **November 29th**. In that meeting we will evaluate the suggestions and other input with an eye toward coming up with one or more paths the church can take with regard to the school, with special focus on what the current faculty and leadership believe is reasonably

doable with the faculty we currently have and can reasonably expect to recruit in the near future.

From there, Brian and I will take the different options to the joint Trustee/School Board meeting on **December 5th**. There we will look at the financial and other resource requirements needed for each of the potential plans and adjust accordingly. After that we will be deep into the Christmas season, but Brian and I will still be doing some processing of everything so that when the entire Society meets on **January 19th**, the different proposed options will be organized and ready for discussion. At that society meeting I am hoping we can come together around one particular vision for the future of the church with regard to the school. From there, Brian and I take it back to the boards to develop a roadmap with specific steps to bring back to the annual business meeting of the Society on **May 17th** for your formal affirmation.

So far it has been a fun and interesting process. It has been gratifying hearing all the different perspectives, hopes, and suggestions for the school, and I am looking forward to hearing more from you in the coming month. There are definitely some themes developing, but I want to hold off on talking about them so as to not bias any future input until this phase of the process is complete.

So, if you and I haven't spoken on this yet, let me know when and how you'd like to provide input. Not everyone reads everything in the *Echo*, so I will also continue sending out individual invitations in small batches over the coming weeks. But like I said: don't feel you have to wait until I contact you individually. My door is open.
