## From the School: *Project Days*

The Washington New Church School works hard at using "handson" learning with our students. It is a way to teach them that learning is for use and by using what we know it also anchors that knowledge with affection. Every year we try to set aside some time to do a schoolwide project. This year, just before Thanksgiving, we decided to focus on the year's theme and design the projects to reflect that theme. This year's theme is **innocence**.

Though we all know that babies and small children reflect innocence we wanted our students to more clearly understand that the real meaning of innocence is **the willingness to be led by the Lord**. From helpless infants, throughout our lives, and on to old age, whenever we strive to follow the Lord, we are in the sphere of innocence.



We were fortunate to begin our project day with real babies. Four of our WNCS moms have relatively new babies and each took a turn visiting a group of students and sharing with the students

some of their expertise about babies. This was a very precious

beginning to our day, giving us a living representation of innocence. After the babies, the students were divided into 4 groups of mixed ages grades JK - 8. Each group had a topic and a project.

**Group #1** led by Candy Quintero and Bonnie Cowley, learned about sheep and all the many uses of the animal. They especially learned why sheep represent innocence and the many times the Word uses sheep to illustrate that willingness to be led. After a time of learning the group made a pastoral scene of shepherds in a field, out of needle felted wool. The mural was topped with a quote from Psalm 100.

Group #2 - Ariel Martin and Erin Stillman led an engaging series of activities to learn about dogs and how they love to be led. Students were able to practice safely approaching, petting, and even walking our visiting dogs (Mac's dog Henry, Laura Cooper's two dogs — Bella & Macallan and Kathy Johns' dog Jumbie). Kathy Johns led a discussion about the many uses dogs provide to people, and how their innocence and love of working drives that use. The program culminated in a fun training exercise where students trained their "dog" (another student) to run an obstacle course involving zigzags, a teeter-totter, and jumping through hoops - all without any talking! The students did a great job, and even competed for the best time: the winner completed the course in 18 seconds!

Group #3 – Led by Carina Heinrichs and Jordan Kinsey focused on baby chicks. This group focused on the development of chicks. They watched some fun videos of chicken embryo development, and then made candle holders with chick embryo pictures on them! It was kind of like candling chicken eggs to see if there was an embryo inside. The kids had fun and the older kids were such a big help with their younger schoolmates!

**Group #4** – Was led by Anne Ball, Sharon Kunkle and Carole Waelchli – This group looked at the physical and mental changes and the progression of innocence in Human Development as a person passes through the stages of life (infancy, childhood, adolescence, adulthood, and old age.) They invited individuals or

married couples as representatives of the first, third, sixth and ninth decades to be interviewed by the students from a prepared set of questions. The students took notes and constructed posters illustrating the changes mentioned above, and the progression of innocence as the individual passes from the innocence of ignorance in the first decade of life to the innocence of wisdom in the ninth. It was a fascinating experience, enjoyed by all, regardless of age!

After the morning projects and a pizza lunch the students took some time in appropriate age groups to talk about what they each can do to protect their own innocence. A particularly useful exercise in this media flooded world.

The students were then released to prepare a special tea for some of the church and school elderly (most of which were octogenarians or older). At 2pm the tables were all set with flowers, tea, and cookies. Our nine elders arrived and were seated at different tables mixed with our students. The 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> grades had developed some very good questions that were written down on slips of paper for the children to engage with the elders – questions like – "What advice could you give us on being better people?", or "Can you tell

us about a lesson that you learned when you were our age?". At first everyone seemed a bit uncomfortable but as I walked around the rooms taking photos, I was amazed at how well behaved the students were, how



willing the elders were to answer their questions (also adding interesting anecdotes), and how quickly more natural conversations evolved. The sphere of innocence was palpable.

WNCS would like to thank the babies and their moms, the dogs, and owners, those who helped demonstrate human development

and especially our elders, George & Mary Cooper, Bill & Dorothy Radcliffe, Nancy Alford, Didi Trimble, Hong Le (Raymonds grandmother), Carole Waelchli and Michael Ferrell.

#### **News that Counts:**

Congratulations to **Eva Smith**, who was recognized by the Red Cross, in early November, for donating over 5 gallons of raw blood. She has gotten to the point where she can fill a 500ml bag (pint) in just over 2 minutes. In addition to the 5 gallons of blood, she has donated 20 units of plasma and 20 units of platelets. It is a three hour sit for each platelet donation. Her plasma and platelet donations are another 4 gallons or more of fluid on top of the 5

gallons of blood. That is an incredible feat. She is now a full-fledged Red Cross volunteer and works at donation sites on weekends. Although many locations pay for these critical supplies, she only donates to the Red Cross which is all volunteer. Eva cites cancer patient's needs, and the fact that blood is the most direct and a 100% donation to someone in need, as her primary motivations.
