# From the Pastor

Happy New Year, friends. I hope your December was one full of peace, family, and the presence of the Lord. For myself, I made the terrible decision to get quite ill just before Christmas, and today, as I write this, I am still not feeling one hundred percent. But despite that, I have to say that I have enjoyed Christmas this year. The tableaux were a delight to be a part of, Brian's Christmas Eve

service was deeply meaningful to me, and on top of that, I've had all four of my kids home for several weeks.

But now the calendars are turning and its time to look forward to the new year to come. Many people take this time of year to renew their vision for their lives, to commit to important changes, as well as to reflect on how they did in the previous year. So, it's appropriate that this January we will be meeting together to discuss a renewed vision for the Washington New Church School.

As I have talked about with you all over the past many months, our school started with a particular vision and mission in mind, but over time circumstances changed. And with those changes came changes in the focus and mission of the school. What started out as primarily a mechanism for educating the children of New Church families in a sphere and under a curriculum informed by the Heavenly Doctrines over time opened up into what we have today: a New Church school, but whose students are primarily from families outside of our church society.

And this is fine. In fact, it's more than fine. As I will lay out in more detail at our Society Meeting on January 19th, there are very good reasons for a church society such as ours to spend energy, treasure, and focus on providing a New Church education to children in general, under certain circumstances.

At the same time, there is no compelling mandate that a New Church society operate a school, nor that such schools should serve families beyond the church's membership. The doctrines do not demand it, and in fact many New Church societies do not have schools, and that's fine, too.

We have a school. What's more, I am proposing that we continue to have a school, but with a new, clearer vision that is more in line with where we are today. But it's up to you. I am asking everyone to come to the Society Meeting on January 19th so that everyone, as a society, can affirm (or not) the new vision and direction for the school. Because it is *your* school. We are not a school; we are a church that operates a school. You are the church. Please come and hear what we plan to do with the school and let us know if you

agree with the plan, because without your enthusiastic support, there is little point to us continuing on. The church and the school must go hand in hand.

Now, what you hear on January 19th will likely not be very surprising. The vision comes from conversations Brian and I have been having with faculty, staff, various boards, and committees, and also with you. I believe that where we are going is in line with what you all want, but it's important to come together to affirm it.

And speaking of which, there are still some individuals we have not heard from. So let me repeat my invitation to each of you personally: I want to hear from you. Nothing is off the table. Tell me what you think about our school, its future, and what we should be doing. I am happy to talk online via zoom, over email or text, on the phone or in person. Just let me know.

And please come to the January 19th meeting where I will present my vision for the school, and where Brian and I will lay out some of the decisions we are looking at regarding the school's structure and its programs. You can ask questions, offer additional suggestions, and let us know what you think. If we get a sense from all of you that we are on the right track, then the next step is to put together a formal plan to be presented at the annual Society Meeting on May 17.

I hope to see you there!




Finally, I would like to recognize the recent passing of Wynne S. Hyatt.
