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From the Pastor - Updating Our School's Mission

[The following is an updated version of what I presented at our society meeting in January.]

The Next Phase for WNCS

As we embark on a new year, it's time to reflect and set a renewed vision for the Washington New Church School. The past several

months have been a journey of engaging with our church community, understanding our needs, and re-envisioning the future of our school.

Our school was originally established with a specific mission: to educate the children of New Church families, under a curriculum informed by the Heavenly Doctrines. However, over time, this mission has evolved. Today, while we continue to serve our church families, we predominantly educate students from outside our church society. This shift, though gradual, signifies a change in our focus and mission.

There are compelling reasons for our church society to focus on providing New Church education more broadly. While there is no

The direction we choose will significantly influence our hiring decisions and the school's overall trajectory. doctrinal mandate for a New Church society to operate a school, or for such schools to serve families beyond the church's membership, doing so aligns with the broader mission of our church. This expansion of our school's mission is not just acceptable; it's desirable.

We are at a critical juncture with signif-

icant faculty and staff turnover. This phase presents both a challenge and an opportunity. Before making new hires, it's imperative to have a clear direction and scope for the school's future. The direction we choose will significantly influence our hiring decisions and the school's overall trajectory.

Over the past months, I've engaged in numerous one-on-one conversations, discussions with our faculty, the Board of Trustees, the School Board, the Pastor's Council, and various people around the wider General Church. These discussions, along with feedback from my Echo articles and sermon series, have been invaluable in shaping Brian's and my understanding and approach.

So now I am sharing a new, updated vision for our school, more in line with our current reality and needs. This vision is not born in isolation but is a result of ongoing dialogues with faculty, staff, various boards, committees, and, most importantly, our church community. Together, we can ensure that our school not only continues to operate but thrives as a beacon of New Church education. Our school is not just an educational institution; it is a manifestation of our church's mission and values. As such, your input, support, and assent, as members of the church, are crucial. I invite each of you to be an active part of this journey. Your perspectives, ideas, and feedback are not just welcome, but essential. Together, we can

ensure that our school not only continues to operate but thrives as a beacon of New Church education, aligned with our church's mission and values.

A Vision for Our School

At the heart of my vision for the Washington New Church School is a deep-seated commitment to serve not just our immediate community, but the Lord's Kingdom as a whole. In a world rife with challenges and moral complexities, our school's role transcends traditional academic goals. We are not just educating children; we are preparing future spiritual adults to contribute positively to addressing the challenges of this world, grounded in New Church truths and values.

Our shift in focus marks a significant transformation from the goal of evangelizing our children to a broader, more inclusive mission. While many of our students may not formally adopt the New Church as their religion, the seeds of New Church doctrines and values we plant in their minds and hearts will have a lasting impact. This approach represents a form of spiritual planting, where the ideals and teachings of the New Church are subtly yet powerfully woven into the broader fabric of society.

In line with our church's commission to provide people with connection, meaning, and purpose, our educational philosophy is anchored in the belief that every child is a spiritual being, destined for a life of charity, faith, and good works. By intertwining spiritual and secular education, we aim to cultivate individuals who are not only intellectually competent but also spiritually loving, wise, and use oriented. Our curriculum must continue to foster an understanding of spiritual truths, guiding students to develop a love of learning and truth, along with a love of serving others. And above all this, we must continue to teach about the Lord and foster a love for him. This approach ensures that even if our students choose different religious paths, the spiritual principles, and values they absorb here will continue to influence their perspectives and actions, contributing to a life of purpose and service, and giving them more options as they face hard and important decisions as adults.

This vision encompasses the nurturing of future spiritual "peacemakers" – individuals who, equipped with the wisdom and values of the New Church, will play pivotal roles in addressing the world's complexities. We are preparing students not just for worldly success, but for spiritual contribution, aligning their talents and capacities with the Lord's grand design for humanity. Truly, our school is not something we primarily operate to serve ourselves, our students, or our students' families. It exists for the sake of the larger world.

As we go forward, I see our school as an integral part of the church's mission – that extends beyond the confines of our immediate community to the vast expanse of the Lord's kingdom. In educating our students, we are not merely imparting knowledge; we are providing spiritual potential to immortal souls, instilling in them the seeds of divine truth and good that will bear fruit in myriad ways over the course of time. This vision is not just an educational strategy; it is a spiritual calling, aligning our efforts with the Lord's plan for a world in need of spiritual enlightenment and love: in short, a world seeking connection, meaning, and purpose.

The New Mission

With the above vision in mind, I am directing Brian and our faculty to carry out the following mission on behalf of our church:

To support parents in nurturing the spiritual, moral, and fintellectual development of their children, using a New Church curriculum taught by New Church teachers. By instilling in our students the values of love, wisdom, and useful endeavor, supported by an excellent secular education, we strive to prepare them to become successful adult contributors to a global society in need of connection, meaning, and purpose. In so doing, we strive to serve the Lord God Jesus Christ, who is the source of all love and all wisdom.

Going Forward

This mission is based on input from all of you. It is based on doctrine. It is based on careful considerations—of myself as your pastor, and also that of Brian, our assistant pastor and your school principal—taking into account what will work with our given resources, our current market environment, the talents and potential of our staff, and our understanding of the relevant doctrines.

What's more, this is not really a radical departure from what we have been doing already. But now we are formalizing it and clarifying it so that everyone can be clear and on the same page.

At our society meeting in January of this year, I heard general affirmation from all present in favor of the vision I described. There are some of you who see potential challenges in committing to an all New Church faculty going forward. I want to acknowledge that those challenges are very real. This part of the mission indeed makes Brian's and my task harder. But I firmly believe, as I have outlined in past articles and sermons, that while anyone can be trained to teach New Church doctrines at some basic level, it takes someone who has been actively embracing New Church values and striving to live them to transmit a New Church *culture* to the next generation.

So that shrinks our pool of potential hires for future faculty positions. So be it. It just means that it is vital that we continue to work to find creative ways of finding and/or helping to create more New Church educators, not just on our own but also in partnership with the General Church.

Conclusion

We are not a school. We are a <u>church</u> that *operates* a school as *one* of its programs. But it is an important program with which we can

do a lot of good for the Lord's kingdom. I believe that this vision and mission for our school is in harmonious alignment with not only the purpose and mission of the Washington New Church, but with the divinely mandated charge given to all churches to provide for the presence of the Lord in the world by means of His Word, and by embodying His love and His wisdom in a community dedicated to His uses. What we are doing here is far more important than merely teaching children reading, writing, and arithmetic. We are helping to build the Lord's future kingdom. And that's a pretty exciting venture that I am grateful to be able to contribute to alongside all of you, the church. May the Lord bless our efforts and guide us all as we do our best to serve Him.

Acton Park, our Treasure

In just a few weeks [Sunday, March 10th right after church] Acton Park will be holding its annual corporation meeting. At this meeting, all attendees will be updated on the recent happening with Acton Park – the solar field update, By-laws updates, among other business and elections for the 3 board members to fill the next 3year term.

Of course, you plan on attending that meeting, right? ... oh, you are not a member of the Acton Park Corporation, and you don't live in Acton Park so why should you? The facts are that you do not have to live in Acton Park to become a member, you only need to be a member of the Washington Church of the New Jerusalem to be a member of Acton Park Corp. As far as I can tell, only about 40% of Washington Society members are actually signed members of AP Corp. Why is that?

A few years after the Church purchased this land and moved here to form a community, the church realized that, as a nonprofit, they needed a taxable corporation to manage developing and selling land. It was formed completely separate from the Washington Church, however, only members of the church could be members of the corporation or sit on the Board of Directors thus protecting this asset for future use by the church.

For the last 60 years Acton Park has worked hard to develop and sell lots as well as maintain the green spaces that were to be reserved for society use... the soccer field, the wetland and nature trails and the unsold land. Hard working elected volunteer board members kept up with the finances – the taxes, the lot sales, and the often-complex work with the County to develop the land.

Over the years the common areas like the soccer field and nature trail were used regularly by the society, not just Acton Park residents. When I moved here 37 years ago there was a regular Sunday soccer game after church. New Church Days, Independence Days and sometimes Labor Days brought large picnics, complete with softball, horseshoes, volleyball etc. At the time I thought it was so nice for Acton Park to host these events and because I lived closer to the city not Acton Park, I did not realize then that as a member of the Washington Society I could become a member of the Acton Park Corp.

This nearly 84 acres of land is extremely valuable! An incredible future asset for the church that you belong to, an insurance policy for the future. Sure, it has been many years since we have been able to do more than map out a few new lots. The vision of a larger community of New Church homes and some quads has yet to materialize. But land rarely loses its value. Besides, the common areas



alone are a real treasure.

Do you realize that there is a mile or more of trails that have been created and maintained by volunteers throughout the woodlands that snake around the upland portion of a protected wetland - a 100-year flood plain which includes a branch of the Patuxent River that eventually flows into the Chesapeake Bay? There is also a lovely meditative worship center on the hill built by the school, and lots of woods to explore where you can see deer, tur-

keys, red tailed hawks, beavers and so much more. Nesting Piliated Woodpeckers are sighted regularly and even bald eagles on occasion, not to mention a variety of songbirds. This land belongs to <u>all</u> <u>of the</u> Washington Society not just Acton Park (though AP manages it). We need more than just the few people who love these woods to enjoy them and also to care for and protect them as well.

You are welcome to this annual meeting [Even if you are not a member]. Take some time out to listen and learn about "the State of the Park." Or consider becoming a member of Acton Park as well. And if you've never walked Acton Park trails... give it a try. Or drop me an email and I will give you a tour.
