## From the Pastor

I want to have a big impact on the world. Many of the people I talk to would also like to make a big difference. This seems especially true of those I meet who are in their twenties, but the desire to change the world is not limited to the young, by any means.

And yet, what can one person do? Maybe you are thinking right now, "Sure, it'd be nice to have a big influence on things, but right now I feel like I can barely control my own circumstances!" And if you think about it, you might realize that most of the things in your own life—let alone the goings on of the larger world around you are largely outside of your control.

Well, there are two pieces of good news on that front. First, it is a good thing that you and I have so little control. Throughout the book *Divine Providence*, we see that the Lord governs our lives down to the tiniest detail, and that if we were to see the Lord's plan, we would try to control it ourselves and so mess things up. So, it's good we are not in control of much.

But we do have some influence. And that tiny influence is in what we choose to do with the thoughts and affections we find in ourselves. We can't control what comes into our minds, but we can use our rationality to discern the true ideas from the false ones, and good affections from evil ones, so that we can then choose to let the

Lord remove the evil and make way for more good.

And that, friends, is how you and I and every person in the church can have an immeasurably large impact on the world. Through the tiny act of observing our inner lives and so entering into the process of repenting, we open a way for the Lord to change us. And when we are changed—even a little bit—it has a very real impact on every one of our interactions with other people.

How many people do you interact with in a given week? Even if it's, say, only thirty people, what do you think the value is of being just a little bit more loving, or just a little bit less selfish, in your relations to thirty other human beings? So, spend this month observing your intentions, not just because it is good for you, but because it can change the world.

#### **Acton Park Woodland Use** – by Bonnie Cowley

It has been much too long since I have taken a walk on the Acton Park trails so last Sunday afternoon I figured that with sunny and 80-degree weather I had no excuse not to go for a walk in the woods. And, wow, I was delighted and rejuvenated!

Acton Park woods are quiet. The tree canopy is broad and lets in only streams of light. The woods are undisturbed [except for well-kept narrow trails]. Fallen trees quietly decompose allowing fungi to flourish, animals & birds to find shelter and food. Though I only heard the calls of a few hawks that day, many times before I have encountered deer, beaver, foxes, and turkeys. Once I was able to quietly watch a piliated woodpecker hunt for insects in an old stump.

Studies have shown that "Exposure to forests and trees: boosts the immune system, lowers blood pressure, reduces stress, improves mood, increases ability to focus (even in children with ADHD), accelerates recovery from surgery or illness, increases energy level, improves sleep." [https://dec.ny.gov/nature/forests-trees/immerse-yourself-for-better-health#Research]

I am not just encouraging you to walk in Acton Park woods for



your own health, however.
Since our regular trail volunteer – David Radcliffe - has been updating the trail, he is asking us to begin to use the trails more frequently, particularly because he had been diverting some of the main trail away from the flood plain.
This helps the flood plain return to a purer state and allows us to walk or run the trail without getting wet feet. David asks that we look for the new

trail flags (see picture above) and walk on the new trail, allowing the old trail to disappear into the forest. On my walk I noticed that many large trees that fell across the trail had trail-size pieces cut out of them. Trees falling across the trail happen often. Sometimes they are very large and take a big chainsaw and a great deal of effort to remove. I know that David Radcliffe, Phil Zuber, and other volunteers work regularly to keep the trails open. Thank you!

Acton Park woods has several trails. The main trail, which starts at the soccer field picnic area (nearly a mile long) and loops around the wetland. A second trail comes off the main toward the lake and Woodmore Estates only to meet back further down the main trail. There is a relatively new trail that goes from the church gravel lot up the hill to our outdoor worship center and continues back down the hill toward the soccer field, crossing the dirt entry road, and meets up with the beginning of the main trail.

There are three bridges that cross the wetland stream. One near the beginning of the main trail and one halfway around that loop near the golf course. Both of these bridges are in desperate need of repair or replacement. Please contact the church office if you would like to either help build new bridges or finance the necessary lumber.





The third bridge was built 6 or 7 years ago by the high school shop class and remains in good condition but could use some railings.

Lastly, The Acton Park Board of Directors met April 30th and approved a new "Woodland Use Policy". This policy

attempts to balance community use with protection for the wetland and other shared spaces on the property. Copies of the new policy will soon be available to all members of Acton Park and all residents of Acton Park. A copy of the new woodland use policy is available upon request to anyone else who wants a copy.

Thanks to Sharon Kunkle and Craig Cooper for their tireless work on this policy and again, thanks, David Radcliffe for all of his work!


#### **School Stuff:**
