#### From the Pastor

### From the Principal



Happy February from WNCS! It's hard to imagine that February is anyone's favorite month, but surely it must be for someone. For school, it is the start of the second semester.

This year, it will also be the start of preparation for the school play, with a performance on <u>April 11<sup>th</sup></u>. Other dates to look forward to including: the school choir at church on <u>March 2<sup>nd</sup></u>, the plant sale on <u>April 26</u> and the School-community BBQ on <u>May 3<sup>rd</sup></u>.

I'm pleased to announce that our teacher search was successful. Jana Sprinkle has accepted our full-time teaching job starting next year. We are excited to welcome her back, and grateful that she already knows WNCS like the back of her hand. Jana's focus will be the first and second grade classroom, but she will also have a small portion of her time given to support our marketing and admissions efforts. She begins this work in a part-time capacity this spring.

To address WNCS's low enrollment, we are working to systematically review and improve our marketing efforts. We have delegated specific roles and areas of focus to "captains" in the hope the more of the details will be successfully tracked and executed. This approach also makes it easier to make use of people willing to help with specific projects. Let me know if you'd like to help and want to hear a catalog of activities where we could use you.

We hold the view that our target radius (about 10 miles) still include many families who are a strong fit for WNCS but who either don't yet know that we exist or don't yet have a clear picture of the value we offer - a spiritually-guided, family oriented, learning environment. It is this lack of knowledge that we hope to address with a more consistent, thorough marketing effort.

That said, I talk with some of our peer schools at school expos, and many are reporting that they too are facing enrollment challenges. I don't know the reasons for these structural challenges that are facing many private schools in this area. The county has seen a decline in the total number of school-aged children so perhaps this is starting to be felt by the schools. Regardless of the reasons for the enrollment challenges, we want to be confident that all families in our area know that we exist and have a positive, clear view of how a WNCS education could powerfully support their goals.

Our primary method for finding strong-fit families is word of mouth, especially from current parents. To this end, we are increasing the tuition benefit awarded to families who make a successful referral. 2025/26 tuition is \$9,700 and each student successfully referred reduces tuition for the year by \$1000.

Our hope is that the opportunity for cash keeps families focused, but that love for the WNCS experience is what inspires them to easily and authentically invite friends to take a tour. One of the things I like to highlight to new families is how incredibly dedicated the teachers are. Teacher morale is an important measure to consider when school shopping. I am daily blown away by the mutual respect and support among our staff and their love and focus on the work they do. This makes me a happy parent – pleased with quality of education my children are receiving.

### From the Board of Trustees

The Board met for its monthly meeting on January 14, 2025. Normal business discussed, including a financial report reflecting lower contributions compared to last year. Rev. Brian Smith reported on the status of the school, including his efforts to recruit

volunteers for specific tasks related to the marketing of the school. Brian shared his thoughts and comments on the deeply felt loss of our former teacher Carina Heinrichs and reflected on Carina's impact. Staffing planning continues for the coming school year. A small committee was formed for the submission of grant requests for various church and school needs. Planning for the Winter Society meeting was a topic of discussion, and topics deferred to the next meeting were Building and Facilities, and the Building Use Policy.

Thirty-two members of the Washington New Church corporation along with some participants of the Congregation gathered on January 24, 2025, for the Winter Meeting of the Society. The sole topic was a presentation and discussion of the Relationship Statement which has been developed by the General Church, with a request for input from the congregation prior to a vote on whether to approve and sign the document planned for the Meeting in May.
