## From the Pastor

As I write this, the school is buzzing with the energy it gets this time every year. Preparations are being made for graduation, kids are excited, teachers are extra busy, and summer is peaking its head above the horizon before us. Soon, things will slow down as they do around here every summer, but for now it feels like we're just about to crest over the top of the final plunge of the flume ride!

On the church side, things are more mellow. I'm putting the final touches on a four-part series on the end of the Book of Revelation which I'm excited to share with you starting on June 1st. They will be "family talks", meaning no separate children's talk apart from the sermon for adults. We shift to the family talk format every summer as well as on holidays, to provide relief for the parents and any other volunteers who often miss the sermons on other Sundays while taking care of little ones. This series will culminate in our New Church Day holiday service on Sunday, June 22nd. Oh, and speaking of New Church Day, on June 19th itself we are planning a blood drive, followed by a barbecue where you can restock your body with fresh nutrients!

On a more personal note, I'm going to be visiting Bryn Athyn yet again this coming weekend. I say "yet again" because I was just there earlier in May for the Swedenborg Foundation board meetings. I have just concluded my first year serving on that board where I am vice chair of their "External Affairs Committee" which oversees both the publishing and the video programming operations of the Foundation, and also the chair of the newly formed "Artificial Intelligence Governance Subcommittee" where we are forming policies to make sure the Foundation's use of AI is not only innovative and useful, but also ethical and secure.

In addition to serving as a board member for the Foundation, I am also on the board of New Church Challenge. NCC is a non-profit organization that provides funding to support people with special needs within the realm of our New Church societies. Projects funded by NCC have included things like job placement assistance for New Church people with special needs, training for New Church teachers serving students with special needs, and other such things. Like with the Foundation, I attend most meetings online but try to be physically present for the annual meeting. Unfortunately, this year I couldn't make it to Bryn Athyn for this year's annual meeting, but usually I try to be there in person. So that's a lot of meetings. In addition to serving the boards of the Swedenborg Foundation and New Church Challenge, I of course serve on the board of trustees for the Washington New Church, the board for the Washington New Church School, and the board of

Acton Park. Throw in my Pastor's Council, and that's a pretty full schedule of mostly evening meetings, to say nothing of the small groups and classes that I lead on some evenings. Oh, and I almost forgot one more "committee": I have been part of a small working subcommittee assisting Jane Enis in the development of an online tool to streamline how pastors and societies report the statistics the central office asks us to collect over the year. But that work should be completed very soon, and we only meet occasionally as it is.

You might think I have enough meetings at this point, but I am now about to join the Bishop's Advisory Committee that works with the bishops to manage the placement and supervision of all the priests in the field. For the past year I have been the "Regional Pastor" for Calvin Heinrichs's church plant in Kansas City, but it was just a "region" of one, so I have been able to avoid duty on Advisory. But going into the next fiscal year I will be picking up two more societies and their pastors to add to my supervisory portfolio, so now our bishops are telling me I will need to attend one more monthly meeting.

But don't get me wrong! I'm not complaining at all. I can't say "I love meetings", but I absolutely do love that I get to serve the church in all these interesting ways. And I think each of the ways that I've been asked to contribute to the overall function and health of the worldwide New Church movement adds something to my work serving you all here at Washington New Church. I am constantly learning things that I bring back into my work here, and I am able to find useful opportunities for our society to connect with the larger New Church community.

So yeah, I go to a lot of meetings. And one of the things I've been thinking about is how organizations use boards and committees and other work groups to get things done. With lessons I've been learning, I have just begun a process of re-examining how we are organized here at WNC, with the goal of updating our internal

structure to help us continue to pursue our mission, and in a way that most wisely engages all of our volunteers and staff while neither burning people out nor wasting volunteers' time.

I've started the conversation with Pastor's Council and will next be talking to the Board of Trustees. For now, most of my work is just studying and planning on my own. But stay tuned, as I will have more to say on all this in the coming months. I'm not expecting anything too radical, but I want to ensure that we are organized in a way that will serve our Society efficiently and effectively so we can continue to be of use to the world for the next phase of our existence.

If you have thoughts on how we organize ourselves to get good things done, please drop me a note or come see me in person. I'd love to hear your thoughts. And have a great start to your summer!

As the name implies, berries will be the heart and soul of my produce operation. My blueberry bushes are full of berries! They are still toddlers of course and need to grow and be joined by many siblings and cousins before I have enough to sell. My strawberry

babies are in the nursery, and I hope to transplant them with more siblings and cousins to their forever home in the fall. My two dozen elderberry children are waiting to join 12 siblings at their forever home too. Eugene Cole has given me some lovely Blackberry babies to transplant. Lincoln gave me some black raspberry babies, and I am going to bring some red raspberry babies from my home to propagate.

Starting in June are "Fridays on the Farm," a day program for children in grades 3 through 6 to learn about growing food and caring for animals. ## **Our Mother Church** *Editorial*

Back several weeks ago while listening to the “Mother’s Day” sermon, I got to thinking about how I no longer have a mother on this earth. My mother lived well into her 90s but even before she passed, I stopped thinking about her as my mother. Don’t get me wrong, I love my mother. She was an incredible woman a loving

and nurturing mother whose lifework it was to stay at home and raise her 12 children as a partner to my dad. She baked her signature whole-wheat bread daily and sold it to others. She sewed, frequently making dresses for all 8 of her daughters. My mom could make wonderful meals out of next to nothing during hard times. However, she was primarily the perfect partner for my dad. Hard-working and incredibly knowledgeable, she managed the house, the children and all the finances [somehow magically!]

But as I grew up, we became more like friends. And the more I thought about that it struck me that the Church was now my mother. In relation to the Lord [our Father] the New Jerusalem (as a bride and wife) is our mother. So, it follows that now that I am an adult, **New Church Day** is sort of adult Mother's Day. I should honor the work she does.

“The reason why mother in the spiritual sense means the church, is that just as a mother on earth feeds her children with natural food, so the church does with spiritual food. This too is why in the Word the church is frequently called mother.” (TCR 306)

I was fortunate to go to a New Church School in Pittsburgh. New Church Day [we called it June 19<sup>th</sup> then] was very special. The end of the school year performance [practiced for many weeks before school ended] was the June 19<sup>th</sup> pageant. Every child in every grade from Kindergarten through Ninth grade played a part. Whether as a “soul under the alter”, one of the 12 disciples or the lucky girl who got to play the woman clothed with the sun [I never did get that role] we all were part of this traditional event.

I have such affection for New Church Day. Even when June 19<sup>th</sup> fell on a weekday, our dads would take the day off work as a personal holiday. Everyone in our church society came out for the pageant which was held outside in the lower or “sunken” garden. I can feel the warm June days... portraying the Revelation stories – Four Horseman, Seven Seals and other scenes, while our pastor

(Kurt Asplundh or Louis King) read the passages in Revelation. Their un-microphoned yet powerful and gentle voices floated over the audience who were sitting on the upper lawn. Above the high wall would appear the Woman Clothed with the Sun, being approached by the Dragon (complete with fire extinguisher sound & smoke) being defeated by Michael and his angels. Year after year, I was part of this beautiful celebration that always ended in a great picnic. Talk about nurturing the affection for truth!

We should be honoring our spiritual mother. Taking time to think of the Holy City New Jerusalem coming down from God out of heaven. When I was a child I thought everyone celebrated New Church Day. Someday I pray that it will be a worldwide holiday! So please join us for our New Church Day celebrations, first on – Thursday, **June 19<sup>th</sup>** for a BBQ picnic and then join us Sunday, June 22 for our New Church Day Festival Service.
