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From the Pastor

"Tremble, and do not sin; ponder in your own hearts on your beds and be silent." - *Psalm* 4:4

Whether through societal conditioning or as a function of innate human nature, people have a general tendency to assume that if they don't know the answer to a question, then they don't know the answer. Testing in schools focuses mostly on measuring whether a certain collection of facts is easily recalled. Intelligence in public discourse is evaluated in terms of whether or not participants have immediate clever responses. Value in the workplace assumes busyness is an indicator for efficient productivity.

But the deepest answers come only after long thought. Wisdom often requires listening followed by protracted times of silence. And improvements in the workplace often only come at the cost of having a worker spend time staring out the window and wondering how things could be different.

Slow down and really observe yourself working if your world lets you. Spend a week—or a month, or a year—on a single question. Allow for pauses in your most important conversations and seek out people who will do the same.

There are plenty of people running at full speed all around you. And there are plenty of times you should be, too. But there are too few who will sit with a question long beyond the first response their mind offers; and there is a difference between solving problems and getting work done. We need both, but unless we solve some of our biggest problems, the work we do may just make things worse.

From the Board of Trustees:

The Board met for their final monthly meeting on June 10, 2025. The Board discussed normal business and status of Church and School activities, held an extensive discussion on the budget for

the next fiscal year, and planned for the upcoming Society Annual meeting.

The Society Annual meeting was held on Friday June 13 and called to order with 28 members present. After worship and approval of minutes, two Memorial Resolutions were offered and approved to remember our friends Carina Heinrichs and James Needer. The resolutions are presented after these notes. A slate of nominations was presented to fill positions on the Board of Trustees and School Board. A motion was passed to approve the full slate, and the following board members were elected:

- Board of Trustees: Lincoln Smith was elected to continue as a Trustee, and new members Erin Stillman and Phil Zuber were elected. Thanks to Craig Cooper and David Glenn for their past service.
- School Board: Charlotte Radcliffe and Paige Sweeney were elected. Thanks to Gillian Frazier and Jenny Smith for their past service.

Treasurer Brent Hyatt presented the proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2026, which after discussion was approved. Bill Kunkle presented for the Contributions Committee, and after discussion presented two motions to ensure focus on our Society's fiscal health, ensuring timely consideration of budgets, and ensuring our Endowment payout is focused on long term viability. The Society also approved adoption of the Relationship Statement between the Washington Society and the General Church.

The first Board of Trustees meeting of the new fiscal year will be held on Tuesday September 9, 2025.


We had a great start, this past Wednesday with an enrollment of twenty-nine students. That may not seem like very many but the growth from last year is four more students. If you note that

SPRINKLEBERRY FARM & EDUCATION CENTER UPDATE

Hello everyone! I have decided to name this year "My Infrastructure Year on the Farm." I am growing a few veggies - tomatoes, corn, and celeriac, but I was so busy trying to get sheds placed, a coop and run built, tarps moved, existing plants mulched, that I did not pay enough attention to my corn, so it was very small. The

tomatoes are still going gangbusters, so if you are in need of cherry tomatoes or beefsteak tomatoes, let me know! Otherwise, I will be making lots of tomato sauce soon.

The good news is that my metal tool shed is no longer sitting on its



roof. Apparently, if they are not anchored down immediately, they may take a tumble for the worse and land on their heads. Even better news is that my chickens have a home! A beautiful coop that my dear friend Stephanie Kuykendall paid for; she had her handyman build it for me. She helped me finish the run, just in time for the Smiths to return from vacation to find no more chickens

in their yard. Adelaide and Acacia with the help of Alder (and perhaps Kai?) raised my hens and surprise rooster from babies into lovely, feisty teens. Of course, they named the rooster Sir Reginald, having recently performed Ballad of the Bremen Band which features a cocky rooster of the same name. My lovely hens, 14 of them, should begin laying eggs soon. I am about to begin the shed build for my future goats. As I have only weekends to work on it now, I am still hopeful that it won't take me the rest of the year to finish it. If anyone LOVES building, feel free to help. And, in October, I am having a high tunnel delivered and built for me. This will allow me to extend the growing season, which means I will be growing brassicas in the spring, tomatoes, eggplant and cucumbers in the summer and kale and radishes in the winter. I am blessed to have received a grant from The Natural Resources Conservation Service which is part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Hopefully, I will be growing kale and radishes this winter!

I am also planning on expanding my blueberry bushes and am tarping the area for next Spring's strawberries! Wish me luck!

As Gold Star family members, we understand the depth of what we and all Gold Star families have endured—and what we continue to carry. This monument will ensure that our loved ones are never forgotten, and their families are recognized as well for the price they have paid.
